Congressman Florello LaGuardia of New York, former major in the Air service in charge of fliers on the Italian front, has thrown interesting light upon the difficulties aced by the United States in co-operating with its allies in the world war. Major LaCluardia has telegraphed the World Trade Club of San Francisco. leading manufacturing merchants, pledging his support to the campaign that the organization is now waging for the world wide adoption or the metric system of weights and meas-

ization of weights and measures. He advocates the meric system

"I still have unpleasant memories of the difficulty we experienced during the war," he wries, "of the loss of time the confusion, owing to difevent systems of weights and measares used by various allies. We lost more time in translating specifications and more errors were caused on this account than by anything

The World Trade Club is receivng similar testimony from a great many persons who had experience with the difficulty caused by our present weights during the war.




