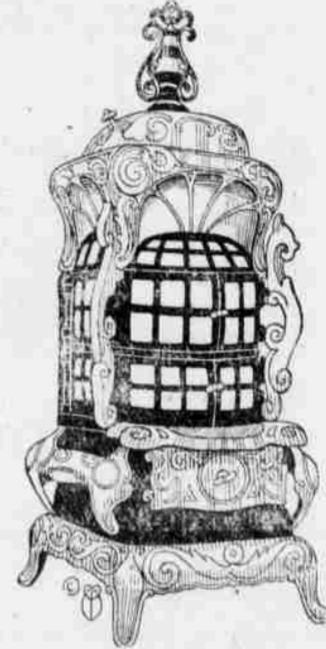

IONE SCHOOL NOTES

George Belknap of Lincoln high entered high school last week as a sophomore.

There are now 22 students in the manual training classes and 31 in home economics classes.

The per cent of attendance for the first month of school was 95.7 with 58 pupils neither absent nor tardy.

Basketball practice started last week with Earle A. Brown as coach for the boys and Miss Mabel Nelson for the girls.

Pupils of the Ione school may be promoted on honor (exempted from final examination in any subject) on the following conditions: (a) Satisfactory department, (b) to be determined by vote of faculty; (c) not more than two cases of tardiness, which must be excusable, and no unexcused absence; (d) class average of 85 per cent.

Any student who is not tardy to school or to any class during the semester and who has no unexcused absence may have ten per cent added to his or her class standing in the subject in which the lowest grade has been earned, providing in all cases a satisfactory standard has been maintained in citizenship.
