Mrs. Cherry Crites passed away at the home of her son, S. L. Crites, in north Heppner Saturday, November 8, 1919, aged 81 years, 10 months and 7 days.

Deceased was born in California, Missouri, on New Year's Day, 1837. She was married to Adam Crites in 1862 and came to Oregon to reside about ten years ago. She was the mother of twelve children of whom five survive her.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon from the Federated church, Rev. H. A. Noyes, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment was in Masonic cemetery.

Knoblock

Mrs. A. J. Knoblock, an old and highly respected pioneer resident of Morrow county died at her home on Rhea creek Wednesday, November 5, 1919, aged about 69 years.

Deceased came to Morrow county before Heppner became a town and had since resided in this part of the county. She was an invalid for many years and for the past few weeks had been failing rapidly so that her demise was not unexpected. She was highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends in the county as a woman of high character, a good neighbor and a loyal friend.

The funeral was held Friday, November 7, at the home, Rev. H. A. Noyes conducting the services. Interment was in the Rhea creek cemetery.

Senator Harold C. Kessinger

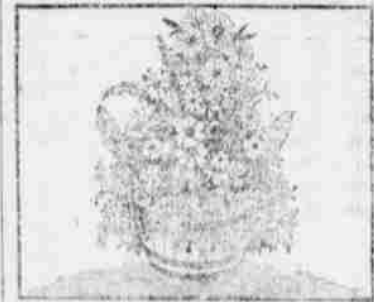
