IONE SCHOOL NOTES

One third of the school year has passed. The regular six weeks examinations are being given the high school.

The 3rd and 4th grades of Miss Nelson's room had the highest per cent of attendance, 99%, during the last month. The second highest per cent was 95 per cent of Miss Angell's room. The per cent of attendance for the entire school was 95.4.

There are now enrolled in the school 85 boys and 70 girls, making a total of 125.

The high school secured Mr. Waldo Davis to give a musical concert with his chimes accompanied by Miss Margaret Jones, whom we were very fortunate in securing. The first classic piece on the program was "Il Trovatore," whose rendering was so harmoniously performed that the audience was much enthused by it.

Other selections were "Morrison Meditation," sextette, "Lucia," and "The Holy City," each being followed by some popular or national song and the audience singing the choruses.

There was a school meeting of voters Saturday at the school house for the purpose of levying a special district tax.

Some of the directors have been visiting the schools, as well as parents, Messrs. Morgan and Howard, Mesdames Howe and Lawson.

A large crowd witnessed the local double header basketball game Saturday after the picture show. The town boys won over the high school boys 44 to 14. The result of the girl's game was 18 to 11 in favor of the high school. The small admission charge of 10 and 15 cents brought \$11.75.

A double header basket ball game between Heppner and Ione teams is scheduled for Ione on Friday, Dec. 5. The price of admission will be 50 and 25 cents. The school urges everybody to come out to the games with plenty of support, as the games promise to be the most important of the season.

Tuesday evening the high school entertained with a Thanksgiving party, many students and friends of

the school being present. Games appropriate to the occasion, including an indoor track meet, were played during the evening. Refreshments of popcorn balls, cider and apples were attractively served by the students.
