The county court has recently been advised by the state highway commission that the following amounts, making up the market road fund, will be available for Morrow county for the current year:

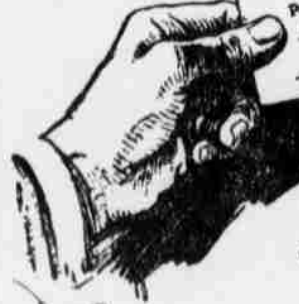
From county 1-mill levy \$14,046.73
From state 1-mill levy..... 11,132.26
From Multnomah county surplus 4,540.35

Total\$29,719.34

Fifty per cent of this fund will be available June 1, 1920, and the remainder on December 1, 1920.

IRRIGON TO HAVE NEW SCHOOL

The live and progressive community of Irrigon is to have a modern, new school building during the present year according to information given the Herald Wednesday by Messrs. Glasgow and Grimm, who were attending the meeting of the county court. The new building will cost approximately \$50,000.

The plan is to build what these gentlemen describe as a common sense school building of eight rooms and with all modern improvements.

The present building will be retained and worked over for use as an auditorium and general community center. It is planned to install a modern moving picture show in the auditorium which will be so arranged as to fill the general neighborhood needs as a community meeting place. The site for the new school building

has not yet been definitely located but it is the intention to secure the best site available for the purpose.

Many new people have located on the Irrigon project within the past year and they are still arriving.

While the coming crop of fruit was rather seriously damaged by the severe weather in December it is not believed that many of the trees were permanently damaged. Peaches and apricots will be a short crop but other varieties will bring at least a partial crop.

Mr. Glasgow and Mr. Grim are both strong for the north and south road saying that Heppner is the best market for Irrigon fruit in the west and with a good trucking road right through they can supply this section of the county with their incomparable product at much less expense than they have been able to do in the past.
