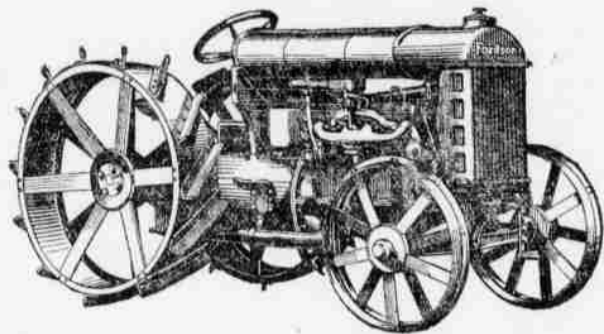

Sealed bids will be received until the hour of 10 o'clock A. M., the 15th day of May, 1920, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the County Court of Morrow County, Oregon, at the office of said Court in the County Court House in the City of Heppner, Oregon, for the purchase of bonds of said County, issued for the building of permanent roads therein in the sum of \$20,000, same being in denominations of \$1000 each, numbered 11 to 200 inclusive, said bonds to bear date November 1, 1919, and to mature absolutely without option of prior redemption November 1, 1929, said bonds to bear interest at not to exceed 5 1/2 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on May and November first, principal and interest payable in United States gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer or at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

Said bids must be accompanied by a certified check for 5 per cent of the face value of the bonds bid for and must be unconditional.

The approving legal opinion of Messrs. Teal, Minor & Winfree of Portland, Oregon, will be furnished the successful bidder.

The Court reserves the right to reject any or all bids. The assessed valuation of the taxable property of the County is \$14,016,750.24.

#### BOARDMAN NEWS

There was a lively meeting of the Boardman Farm Bureau on the evening of the 16th, at which time resolutions were passed favoring the appropriation of money from the district funds of district No. 2 for a reconnaissance survey of the Boardman-Irrigon-Lexington road. It was further resolved that the support of the organization be given the college millage tax bill, the public school millage tax bill and the state road 4 per cent bond limit bill.

A committee consisting of S. H. Boardman, A. L. Larsen and W. H. Stewart was appointed to complete arrangements for a John Day Boater Barbecue to be held on the project some time in June just before the first cutting of alfalfa.

Mrs. W. H. Stewart was elected social leader of the bureau and the monthly meeting will in addition to the business session be assured of some social features regularly.

Miss Bertha Davis of the home economics department of O. A. C. visited our schools and community on last Thursday. She was very favorably impressed and compliments Eastern Oregon in general on its up-to-date buildings and progressive spirit.

With the election of Maude E. Lamson, of Cove, Oregon, as home economics teacher the faculty of the Boardman schools is complete for the coming year. The other teachers are Naomi Runner and Blanche Sherman of Falls City, C. C. Johnson of Pullman, Wash., Miss Daisy Lee of Milton, Mrs. W. H. Stewart of Boardman, Miss Myrtle McNeil, of Boardman, M. B. Signs of Boardman as principal.

Plans have been completed for cafeteria service in the school for the remaining weeks of the term. It is however, to be considerable of a problem and it is rather amusing to look over the school menu of a few years back when quite an elaborate lunch might be served for three cents.

The Industrial club work is progressing. There are standard clubs in sewing I and II; poultry, I; cookery, Pkg. I; several individuals are also working on corn, sheep, pig II, etc. As soon as the seeds arrive garden work will be started. All this will lead to the local and county fairs next fall. The Grange has appointed a fair committee, the farm bureau will do so, and in cooperation with the school a fine showing will be made.

Water will begin to run in the irrigation ditches at once. The town and the school district are constructing a permanent water way from the S. E. corner of the school forty, R. Rands is doing the work.

#### PLANT FOODS IMPORTANT

Plants depend for soil food chiefly upon ten soil elements. Five of these are always present in cultivated soils, but five others are likely to be exhausted by continued cropping. These limited five are nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium and sulfur. Soil surveys of Oregon counties to determine soil content and condition are under way by O. A. C. and the U. S. D. A. The first publication of findings "The Soils of Jackson County", has just been issued by the experiment station, O. A. C., Corvallis. Copies are free.
