THE EDUCATIONAL MEASURES
To the Public:
May we ask you to read carefully the following letter in regard to the Educational Measures which are to be voted upon the twenty-first day of this month. And may we also ask those of you who favor the measures to be sure to vote. Too often we believe a thing to be right and just, but are too busy to take the time to go to the polls and vote. We take it for granted that because these measures should pass they will without our voting. The opposition on the other hand, are always there, so let us not neglect our duty.
Following is a brief explanation of the Measures:

The Two-Mill Tax Measure for Elementary Schools
1st. The tax is to be upon all property of the state.
The valuation of taxable property in Morrow county, not included in any school district is nearly \$700,000. This means that that amount of property does practically nothing toward the support of the public schools. Also, all of the property in school districts which do not levy special school taxes are doing practically nothing for the elementary schools.
When this is distributed on the teacher basis it will give to the weak district a fund, sufficient to employ a competent teacher.
The districts which do not need the additional fund will simply lower their district tax. Remember that is now 70 per cent of the funds necessary to support the school in your district.
This tax will correct the inequalities.

The boys and girls in not less than 500 school districts of Oregon will be without teachers next year if this bill fails to pass.
The College Millage Tax
Every man and woman in the state of Oregon who is a loyal American citizen should support this measure. The State University, Oregon Agricultural College and Normal School are in great need of more money at the present time, or their efficiency will be greatly jeopardized. 15 per cent increase in classroom space, and 3.8 per cent increase in income. 150 per cent increased enrollment and the buying power of our dollar only 45 cents. Let us vote for this measure and thereby protect higher education in this state.

Soldiers, Sailors and Marine Educational Bill
American people look upon the sacrifice of life as none too high a price to pay for the liberation of mankind. The faith of America is faith in God and man. She believes in brotherhood and opportunity, in justice and mercy, therefore it behooves us as American citizens loyal to the brave boys, who fought that we might enjoy peace, to support this bill. Let us not forget what we owe them. It means but twenty-cents on \$1000.

NOT ASKING FOR MORE ROAD MONEY

The State Highway Commission is not asking for more road money, said R. A. Booth, commissioner, in addressing a Lane county audience on the 4 per cent road bond limit measure. "All we want is the power to capitalize the income now on hand. The state road funds are now taken from two sources—the one cent tax on each gallon of gasoline and the automobile license fees. The state constitution, as it now reads, prohibits more than 2 per cent being put into the roads, and what the commission wants is an amendment of this clause so 4 per cent can be put into the roads. A direct additional tax is not asked for, nor is any increase in the gas tax or auto license fees."
Mr. Booth also brought out that "a new road program is not to be rushed through, but the present one is to be finished providing the voters of Oregon back up the 4 per cent limit measure."

Commissioner Simon Benson is also on record against rushing construction too rapidly, considering high labor costs and the high cost of money, but favors ratification of this 4 per cent bonding amendment so there will be authorization to issue bonds at such times as favorable conditions justify. Final control over actual bond authorization rests with the legislature, as unless the legislature passes enabling legislation under the 4 per cent amendment, the highway commission is without authority to issue bonds.
