DOROTHY DALTON HAS FINE ROLE IN "HOMEBREAKER"

Famous Star Seen as Traveling Saleswoman in Her New Picture.

Dorothy Dalton has a decidedly new characterization in the Thomas H. Ince photoplay "The Homebreaker" which comes as a Paramount offering to the Star theatre for next Sunday.

She appears as a traveling saleswoman and the part offers her opportunity for some clever comedy work. Miss Dalton made her first big bit in pictures in a dramatic role in "The Flame of the Yukon", and has established reputation as an emotional actress. That she is delightful in comedy drama was also proven in "Hard Boiled," in which she appeared as a theatrical trooper. Among her other recent successes are "The Lady of Red Butte", "Extravaganza" and "Quicksand."

In "The Homebreaker" Miss Dalton is supported by Douglas MacLean, leading man. Edwin Stevens, a famous musical comedy star years ago, Frank Leigh, Beverly Travis, Nora Johnson and Mollie McConnell. It is a charming picture in every respect.

Besides playing two roles herself, Mary Pickford has surrounded herself with notable cast in her latest production for Artercraft, which will be shown at the Star theatre on Friday, August 20. The photoplay is adapted by Frances Marion from W. J. Locke's novel, "Stella Maris", and produced by Marshall Neilan, whose masterly direction of Miss Pickford's last two successes, "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm" and "The Little Princess" caused much favorable comment. Miss Pickford plays the role of Stella Maris and of Unity Blake, two entirely different parts, each carrying a powerful appeal.

The characters surrounding the Artercraft star in the production have been especially well chosen. Conway Tearle, who has maintained a notable reputation on the stage and in films for some years, was engaged to go to the West coast studio of Artercraft to play the role of John Rhea, English journalist and gentleman, who proves an ideal selection for the leading supporting role. Camille Ankewich, a member of the lanky stock company, is cast for the difficult part of John Rhea's wife, a woman whose finer sensibilities have been utterly lost through drink. Herbert Standing, the eminent English actor of many years of stage successes, appears as Sir Oliver Blount, an English nobleman and uncle of Stella Maris. Miss Ida Waterson is the distinguished, yet motherly, Lady Eleanor Blount, while Josephine Crowell appears as an aristocratic English spinster.

On the eve of assembling a crew of 40 pickers to gather 15 carloads of Bartlett pears, five of unknown origin destroyed last week the packing house and warehouse buildings of the Del Rio orchards, situated two miles below Gold Hill.
