

FACTS ABOUT ALASKA

Alaska has nearly as many varieties of climate as can be found in the Eastern and Middle Western States.

Manufacturers of pulp and paper in British Columbia and Alaska have little to fear from each other and much to gain in the common development of the Pacific coast region.

The permanent snow fields of Alaska only cluster round the crest lines of the highest mountain ranges, as they do in the Swiss Alps, and are less than one per cent of Alaska's total area.

The Act of Congress of February 7th, 1905, allows the exporting of pulpwood and wood pulp from the National Forests of Alaska, and the Act of June 4th, 1897, authorizes the sale of timber on all the National Forests.

The transition in ten years of the United States from an exporter of newsprint to an importer, securing two-thirds of its supply abroad subject to any restrictions which may be to the interest of the exporter to impose, will make it to the interest of paper users to patronize the manufacturers of Alaskan pulpwood.

As any pulp mill in southeastern Alaska would be built on tide water and as the tidal variation is about 15 to 20 feet, there would be no difficulty in satisfactorily disposing of the wastes into sea. On this account the mills of the region would have an advantage over the great majority of mills in the United States.

FOREST NOTES

Receipts from National Forest business in the North Pacific district for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, totalled \$569,663.88, which is \$106,000.69 greater than the receipt of the preceding year, according to a report just compiled in the office of District Forester, George H. Cecil, Portland.

The Whitman National Forest, eastern Oregon, leads in receipts with a total of \$119,252.87. In the second place, is the Tongass National Forest Alaska, with receipts of \$94,210.23; the Crater Forest, in southern Oregon, comes third with \$81,074.99; while Columbia Olympic and Wallowa follow in the order named with \$44,964.96, \$43,581.07, \$41,541.84 receipts respectively.

By far the greater portion of these receipts came from timber sales which brought in \$518,845.17 during the year and an additional \$8,581.35 from timber settlement and timber trespass. The Whitman National Forest leads the district in timber business, with a total of \$96,806.94, receipts from timber sales alone. The Tongass National Forest, Alaska, comes second with \$79,878.63, and the Crater Forest in southern Oregon, occupies third place with receipts of \$69,578.03. The Columbia Forest, Washington, \$41,518.75; the Olympic Forest, Washington, \$28,751.54; and the Siskiyou Forest, in Oregon, \$28,578.88, follow in the order named. Other Forest doing timber sale business in excess of \$10,000 are the Rainier, \$22,703.65; the Oregon, \$21,414.29; Snoqualmie, \$21,166.50; Umpqua \$17,482.94; Washington \$17,056.15; Wenteos, \$12,870.11; Situla \$10,644.92; Coville \$10,381.29 and the Chugach \$10,200.25.

The Wallowa Forest leads in receipts from grazing with \$59,963.34; the Malheur with \$24,457.04, comes second; and the Ochoco, with \$22,605.37, third. The Wenaha \$22,374.22; the Whitman \$20,207.37 and the Fremont \$19,513.76, occupy the fourth, fifth and sixth places. Of the six leading grazing Forests for 1920 five are located in Oregon and the sixth, the Wenaha, partly in Oregon and partly in Washington. Other grazing forests having receipts in excess of \$10,000 are the Minum \$19,382.07; Okanogan \$18,179.65; the Coville \$15,105.59; the Umatilla \$13,319.25 and the Rainier \$10,987.81.

The Tongass National Forest, Alaska, leads in special use business, with total receipts of \$11,000.40. The Chugach, in Alaska, comes second with \$2,411; the Wallawa, third, \$1,963.28; the Crater, Coville and Olympic following in the order named.

The Oregon leads in waterpower business, with receipts of \$5,112.81. The Tongass came next with \$2,231; and the Whitman third, \$865.

Five trespass on nine Forests brought in \$15,367.34 and grazing trespass on 12 Forests \$5,112.73. Timber trespass on five Forests paid \$1,910.52; \$7,571.40 covers timber settlement cases on five Forests, the Olympic leading with \$4,204.50. The

Olympic leads also in fire trespass, with \$9,684.91. Twenty-five per cent of the total receipts for the district, \$215,165, will be returned to Oregon, Washington and Alaska, to swell the road and school funds of the counties or districts in which the National Forests are located. Ten per cent more, \$85,066, must be spent in road or trail development within the Forests themselves. The total receipts from the National Forests of the country for the last fiscal year were \$4,793,482.28 which is nearly a half million dollars more than for the preceding year.

WOMEN'S UNIT GOES UP

Board of Regents Finds Requirements Necessitate Building. Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, August 20.—Construction of the first unit of the women's dormitory has been begun by the college, which refused all bids for contracts recently because they were considered too high.

The board of regents found that it would not be possible to carry out the entire building program mapped out for this year if contracts were let at prices submitted. The building committee saw an opportunity to effect such economy as would save the state substantial sums and allow funds to continue the construction program necessary to provide adequate room for all students who seek to enter and assumed the building responsibility.
