Stewart, Boardman; V and VI, Miss Myrtle McNeill, Portland; VII and VIII, Miss Blanche Scharman, Portland; High school, Miss Naominer, Salem, History, Latin and English; Miss Frances Beebe, Portland, Home Economics and girls' sports; and M. B. Signs, principal. The faculty has been selected with a view to their interest in community life as well as school qualifications, and conditions seem favorable for a very successful year.
