**SHERMAN FARMERS CLAIM WHEAT COSTS \$1.85 PER BU.**

Careful investigations made by the Sherman County Farm Bureau, based on figures kept by cooperating farmers, reveals the fact that the average cost of producing a bushel of wheat last year was \$1.85. Half of the farms produced their crop at a figure above this, some running as high as \$2.40. What will happen to wheat farmers forced to sell on the present market is only too well known by those familiar with conditions.

The county farm bureau, which has 70 per cent of the farmers in its membership, and which has been very active along these lines, is in a position to speak for the section. At the last session of the executive committee a draft of the available figures was made and sent to the representatives and senators from Oregon as well as the American Farm Bureau Federation.

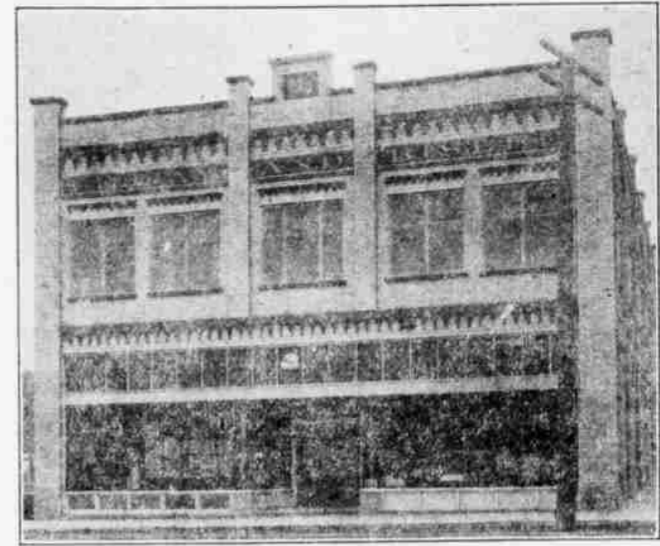
