Unusual Styles in Negligees



A GOOD many women have the dramatic instinct that makes them enjoy masquerading in unusual styles, some of which are commandeered from remote countries and some of them original or even bizarre creations which find inspiration near home. Fabrics, passing whims of fashion, and current events lend a hand in the evolution of the latter and occasionally the garb of other lands is worked out in the fabrics of our own country, and more or less modified to suit ourselves. There is just one place where the woman of good taste in dress can afford to indulge her whims and fancies to her heart's content, and that is within the four walls of home.

Very definitely borrowed from the Orient in its style, the distinctive garment at the right of the picture above, is fashioned of a purely American "Mandarin" brocade and plain satin. The designer has accomplished a unique pantaloon effect in the satin and an odd and graceful drapery of the brocade.

The negligee at the left is a brilliant affair in which a material known as Pan Ondulay—a heavy crepe-like silk—is simply draped. One arm is covered with the most ample of sleeves and the other is uncovered. A wide sash of plain satin ribbon goes over the shoulder and a twisted girdle of it makes a luxurious rope in effect. White glass beads in a wide lattice pattern, add a frosty glitter. All this glitter of beads and sheen of silk makes the monstrous and sinister looking spider, embroidered in black beads, a horribly fascinating beastie. He seizes and holds the attention as if it were caught in his web, and that is what he was put there for. His presence might be dispensed with, for this is a quite practical style in negligees which was originally designed for exhibition purposes—hence the spider.
