SAYS DEAN F. G. YOUNG

University of Oregon, Eugene. Get everybody busy," said Dean Frederick G. Young of the school of sociology, when asked to give a remedy for the crime wave sweeping over the country. "There is no magic about it. If everybody is busy at the right sort of productive employment he will have a surplus to exchange and will be free from the post-war financial troubles."

A sort of clearing house for the nations in which they will get together and bolster up the credit of those that are down and see that the exchange is not tampered with, was given as another effective cure for the chaotic condition of affairs that leads to a large amount of crime. This would require a great deal of generosity on the part of the nations but would be a great aid to the stabilization of conditions.

The causes of the crime wave come directly from the war, according to There are two main factors that cause this trouble.

"The first is that war always disintegrates the moral standards of the people, develops in them a spirit of recklessness, and dulls their sensibilities," said the dean.

The general shake-up of the occupations, and the displacement of the workers was the second reason given by the doctor. The war, he said, in developing armies took the people away from their former peaceful callings and it was difficult for them to get back.
