## WILD ANIMAL BOUNTIES COST COUNTY \$25,362 IN 10 YEARS

A statement recently prepared by county clerk Waters relative to wild animal bounties paid by the county during the ten year period ending December 31, 1920, shows this item to have cost the county the sum of \$25,362 during that time.

A study of the report seems to indicate that a big bounty is cheaper in the long run than a small one, the greater amount being more of an incentive for trappers to devote their time to the work. In the years of 1911-12-13-14, when the bounty was \$1.50, the total amounts paid were \$1955, \$2227, \$2441, and \$2629.50 respectively, while in 1915 with the bounty raised to \$3, the amount paid jumped to \$5965.50, and the following year, when the bounty was reduced to \$1.50 the total dropped to \$1278, and in 1917 it took another drop to \$1164. Then in 1918 and 1919 when the bounty was again raised to \$3.00 for males and \$4.00 for females, the totals went up again to \$2763 and \$2709 respectively.

It would be hard to make a guess how many sheep would be left in the county by this time if no bounties had ever been paid for predatory animals.

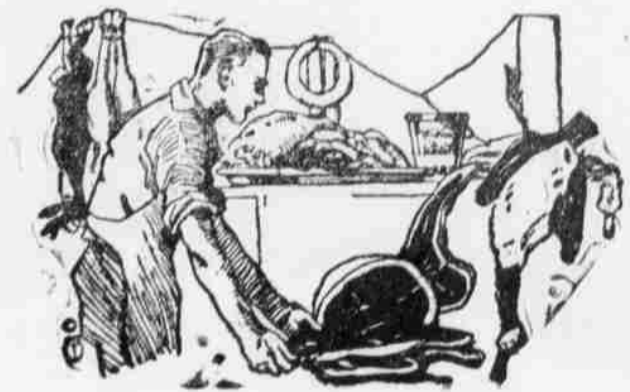
