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OIL SPRAYS SHOULD NOT DISPLACE LIME SULFUR

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Feb. 28, 1921.—Lime-sulfur sprays as a dormant or delayed dormant control of scale, red spiders, pear leaf blister mite, twig miner and mealybugs, should not be discarded for oil emulsion sprays, replies A. L. Lovett, college station entomologist, to queries of growers who write to ask him about the oil sprays.

"The right type of oil sprays will effectively handle these same insect troubles," says professor Lovett, "but the oils vary greatly and our knowledge of them and their action is by no means complete."

Lime-sulfur, on the other hand, is definitely known as to materials, method and time of application and results. It combines fungicidal and insecticidal value, and has justly won universal favor as a general cleanup spray.

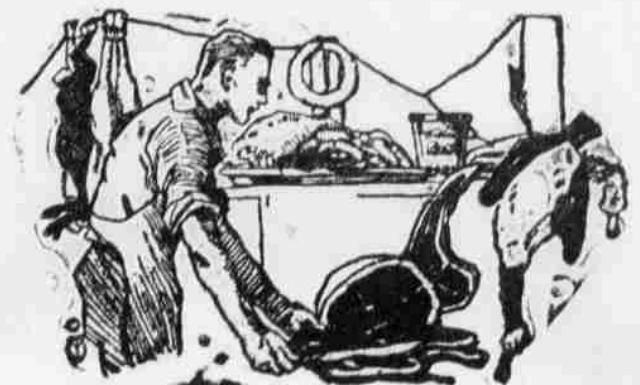
