### IRON IN-BOARDMAN TO JOIN NORTH MORROW CO. FAIR

ANNOUNCED FROM IRVING

An announcement was made at the Dillards, As. Y. L. Larson, S. H. Boardman, James M. Dohle and Bruce, of Boardman, after Saturday evening, that the North Morrow County Fair would be held at Boardman on Saturday evening, April 1, and the Boardman farm business, the interest in the "Greater South Morrow County Fair", and to continue with us to perfect this organization.
