UTAH WOOL GROWERS REFUSE 16 2-3 CENTS

SALT LAKE.—The first wool sale of the season held at Jericho, Utah, was not successful from a growers standpoint. Buyers representing eight large firms were present but only two bids were submitted and the highest was 16 7-8 cents a pound. As this wool, which is conceded the best grown in Utah, brought 72cents a pound at the sealed bid sale last year, the growers refused to accept the low offers and the sale was called off. The clips will probably be shipped to the east on consignment.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Chairman Sirovot of the House committee on public lands has offered the committee report favoring a bill recommended by the secretary of the interior clearing the title of 200 acres of land owned by E. W. McComas on the Columbia river near Pendleton Oregon. This land was brought from the state under the swamp land act a number of years ago and it has been impossible to perfect the title, although the property has been greatly improved.
