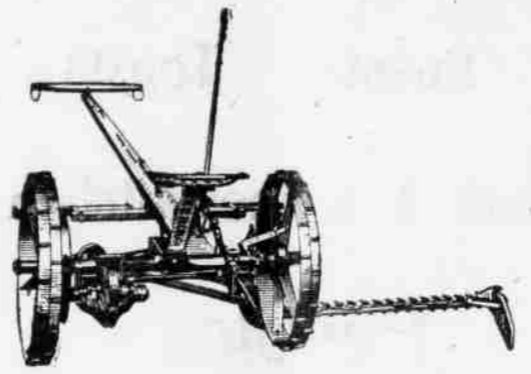
Christian Science
