SCENES from the unique camping party of the year are shown above, the principals being President Harding, Henry Ford, Detroit genius, and Thomas A. Edison, electrical wizard and inventor, and H. S. Firestone, tire manufacturer. These famous men recently sought seclusion and quiet among the Maryland and West Virginia mountains, camping at one night stands, motor-ing, horseback riding, fishing and resting from the strenuous duties

which weigh upon them during the remainder of the year. With Firestone, Edison and Ford these camping excursions have become an annual event. Formerly John Burroughs, the aged naturalist, was a member, but his death last spring removed his patriarchal figure from the group. By his associates he was esteemed so highly they considered no less personage than the president of the United States could take his place, and Mr. Harding accordingly was invited to

take his bunk. The president slept in a converted army tent, as did the others, and proved an amiable and helpful camping companion. Despite the fact that a few attendants were with the party, he insisted on doing his share of the camp chores, as did the others, devoting most of his attention to the woodpile. Few persons have the distinction of eating dinner cooked over a campfire. The president's tent was chopped by the presidential axe.

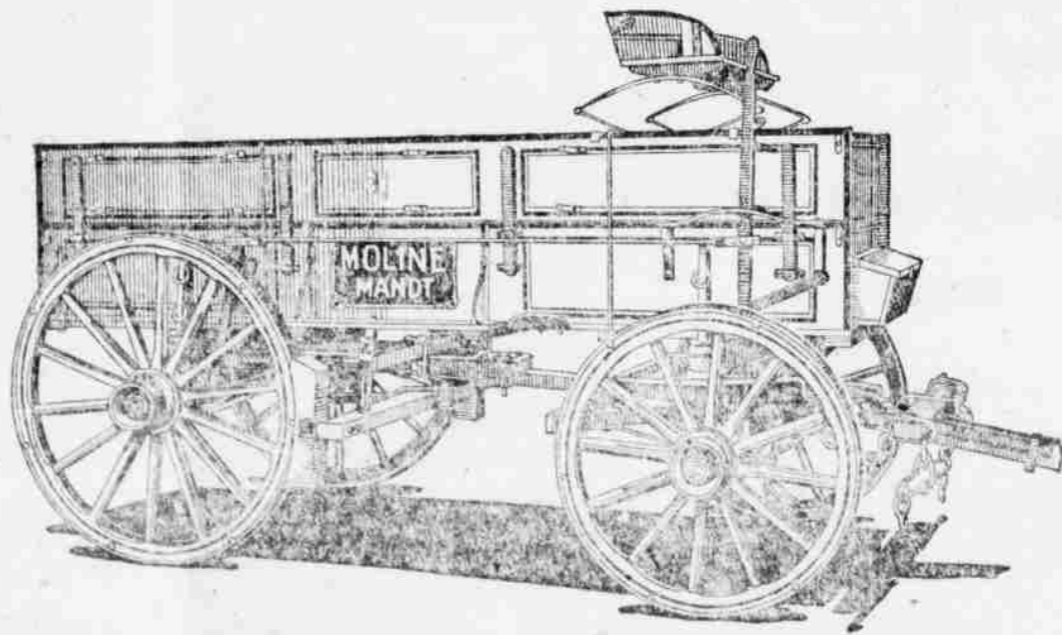
