TWO LESSONS OF PAST WEEK

Two matters of public concern have been forced to the front by occurrences of the past week should receive early consideration by public officials.

One is the urgent need of better accommodations for caring for insane prisoners at the county jail, making it possible to restrain those unfortunates in such a way that they could not injure themselves nor their guards. A padded cell is the humane, modern way for caring for this unfortunate class of prisoners and such should be provided here.

Another urgent need is the installation of telephones in the homes of peace officers. When an insane man left a local hospital the other night, it was found that neither the sheriff, his deputy, nor the city marshal could be reached by phone.

County and city officials should take immediate steps to remedy this condition and should provide telephone connections for their officials who are occasionally needed very badly during the night. The cost to the public would be trifling when compared to the added efficiency of the officials and the possible protection of life and property.

Those in authority should give these matters early attention.
