He was born on a farm in Jefferson County, Pennsylvania, and came to Oregon in 1901. Shortly thereafter he began his business career as a clerk n a drug store at Clatskanie, Oregon Eventually he acquired ownership of the drug store, sold it and bought a drug store in Hood River, where he lived until 1914. In Hood River his ability for organization asserted it During the eight years he spent in that town, he was one of the build ers of the telephone system there, the Oregon-Washington Telephone Company, and built the Central Building, Oregon Hotel and the Hall Building, and owned and planted a number of orchards in the Hood River Valley, He also served as Director and President of the Hood River Commercial Club. His activities were transferred to oos Bay in 1914 and immediately thereafter a number of new organizations in that district came into being. He organized the Coos and Curry Telephone Company of which he is President today; organized the Bank of Southwestern Oregon in 1917 and was President of that institution until 1921 Outside of his business activities in Marshfield, he soon became one of the prominent citizens of that district. He was one of the original promoters of the State Highway program. He was elected Senator from the Eighth Senatorial District comprising Coos and Curry countles in 1920. Senator Hall soon became one o the leaders in state-wide politics as a fearless exponent of the highway program. As a Legislator he played a prominent part in all important legislation during both sessions in 1921. He risked censure from the exponents of the 1925 Exposition Bill when he refused to listen to any proposed in roads into the road funds for the purpose of financing the Fair. Hall's unleviating course in this latter action rought forth the highest praise from Il parts of the State. Since his debut into state-wide poliics, the leadership in various non olitical movements has gravitated inturally to him. He is a member of he Oregon Land Settlement Commission and served for three years as President of the Oregon State Cham er of Commerce and is now a director of trut organization Friends of Senator Hall proclaim him as a natural leader, and point with pride to his record of achievements in public and private life. Others con ede that his judgment is sound and admit that no outside pressure or logrolling can swerve him from any program or movement to which he has fedicated himself Mr. Hall was married in 1966 in Portland to Ann English.
