EARLY WHEAT SEEDING MAKES BEST SHOWING

(By C. C. Calkins.) That it pays to seed fall wheat early has been clearly demonstrated this spring from the results of the different dates of seeding over the country last fall.

We have been checking up on the early and late seeding in Morrow and Sherman counties and have also taken the matter up with D. E. Stephens Superintendent of the Moro Experiment station, where they are doing considerable work along this line.

We find that the early seeded fall wheat in Sherman county is the wheat which is giving the promise.

Mr. Stephens states that in their trials of dates and rates of seeding winter wheat that the wheat seeded on the two dates, September 26th and October 10th, are the wheats which look the best at the present time.

Mr. Stephens also states that it has been his observation that fall wheat should be seeded before the 29th of October, which usually means that most farmers will have to start seeding wheat prior to that time.

Many of the more successful farmers in Sherman county, however, have made it a practice for a number of years to start seeding by the 10th of October, whether the moisture conditions are favorable or not, feeling that they take less chance in dry seeding than in the late seeding.

TUBERCULIN TESTS TO BE MADE AT BOARDMAN

Tests conducted by Dr. E. R. Derringer, deputy state veterinarian, will be made on all milk cows on the Boardman project next week to discover if any tubercular trouble exists in the dairy herds.

The tests are made without any expense to the farmers and dairymen, the expense being born by the state. Cattle found affected by the disease will be killed and where the disease is not too far advanced the meat may be sold for consumption. The state and county will pay up to \$35.00 to make up the difference between the appraised and the salvage price and up to \$50 on pure-bred stock, and the federal government will pay 33 per cent of any balance of the difference remaining.

their teeth when they get their permanent set. Their teeth need good care then. There are twenty teeth in the temporary set. There are several kinds of teeth. The first two front teeth are incisors, and back of the incisors are the canine, then back of the canine are the two bicuspids, and the six year molars. Each is suited to its special purpose.

Only a clean brush and clean food should be put in the mouth. All other things are harmful. Dental floss is used to remove small particles from between the teeth. Nits should never be cracked between the teeth. Ice water also cracks the enamel of the teeth and causes decay. Therefore in order to have good health we should care for our teeth.

The permanent set should be taken very good care of. They are thirty-two in number.

We should go to the dentist about twice a year. If there are any decayed he should fill them at once.
