

### Noted Men's Concert Group Coming to Chautauqua

Remarkably Gifted Musical Organization Is the New York City Concert Quartet Which Will Appear Here as Delightful Chautauqua Feature on the Last Day



Lovers of really good music have a genuine treat in store when the New York City Concert Quartet comes to Chautauqua the last day. This noted organization, composed of four of New York's most gifted vocalists, presents a program of classical and popular numbers, given with an artistry which stamps it as one of America's finest male quartets. The personnel consists of John Besse, first tenor; Albert Lufello, second tenor and pianist; Artells Dickson, baritone, and Albert Erler, bass. Their program will satisfy the most fastidious, for not only are all solo artists of note in the New York musical field, but the ensemble effects are given with a delicacy of shading and blending that is most rare. They have exceptionally fine voices and each has enjoyed extensive experience in oratorio and concert fields. Mr. Dickson, having been born and raised in Louisiana, where he learned some of the negro folk songs he uses on the program. His art, however, is by no means confined to his interpretation of the Scotch and negro songs. They have a surprisingly varied repertoire and their Chautauqua programs will include some classical numbers of most difficult interpretation, an abundance of popular songs and some very interesting musical character presentations. The solo work will also prove a most enjoyable feature for each is an artist of distinction and real musical attainment. If you love real quartet harmony, furnished by real voices, better be on hand at the Chautauqua when the New York City Concert Quartet comes to town.

### GUY MARRINER, PIANIST, IS PROMISING FOREIGN ARTIST

### MARINES PUZZLE NEW YORK

Queer Uniforms on Brazilian "Leath-erneck" perplex Experts of the Metropolis.

Something with which even the war didn't familiarize the observant American public, or at least the people of New York city, was the Brazilian marine. Despite all the varied types of uniforms seen about Times square and notwithstanding the fact that there were many "leath-erneck" due to tell immediately just what the uniform stood for the recent appearance of members of the Brazilian battle "Illinoi" Corps at the New York city yard was a setting to many ex-perts.

The Brazilian marine—and there are only a few of them, inasmuch as Brazil has but one large battleship—is dressed in a most unique uniform. It is a combination of elements: a Scotch Highlander's bonnet with the streamers and a blouse of red, fashioned like that of a mounted policeman, and black trousers. The summer dress worn aboard the battleship is the same style, but in white-drill cloth.

Even the dwellers about Sands street and Flinders avenue, who have seen the dress of every navy in the world, were rather trim looking, dark hued men, who rarely left the navy yard, but could be seen inside the gates. Occasionally one would walk around the yard a bit, but they were not seen out and along the streets frequently. They finally discovered that these were the "leath-erneck" of Brazil.—New York Sun.
