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PORTLAND WILL BACK UMATILLA PROJECT

Friends of the Umatilla Rapid-power project in eastern Oregon and Washington will rejoice to know that at a recent meeting of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, that body gave the project their unqualified approval and went on record as being on the job to put the big undertaking across in the shortest possible time.

Strong delegations from Heppner, Pendleton, Umatilla, Boardman and other eastern Oregon and eastern Washington towns were present at the meeting as invited guests of the chamber and speakers from this section of the state presented the claims of the project so forcibly that, in quote from one gentleman who was present from the north end of Morrow county, "The project is absolutely sold to Portland, and now it's up to the head of all northwest power projects in the estimation of the business men of that city."

It is understood that Judge G. W. Phelps, who has been president of the Umatilla Rapids association for the past year, has expressed a desire to retire from that position because of the increase of his judicial duties and that S. H. Boardman, of Boardman, is being urged by Portland and other interested towns and communities to succeed him.

No better choice could be made for the place as Mr. Boardman is not only one of the original promoters of the project but he also possesses the necessary technical knowledge and special vision to lead the way in making this magnificent dream of cheap electrical power for a vast area that sorely needs it, a glorious reality.

Mr. Boardman closed the present year's term of the Boardman project more than 29 years ago and is strong wain faith in that vision that nothing daunted him in working through many weary years for its fulfillment.

More power to him in helping put through this later dream.

SENATE HAS WIND STORM SAYS SENATOR CAPPER

"A constant state of anxiety, a rush of air reaching the enormous total of 1,452,000 words and occupying 745 pages of fine type in the Record," Senator Arthur Capper reports of the first month's discussion of the tariff bill by Congress. And only thirty-five of the 428 pages have been considered as yet.

"During the month or more that the new tariff bill has been before the senate, senators have spent hours discussing such pressing subjects as the French Revolution, which ended in 1793, the utter-war situation in Russia, the federal reserve system, and other topics as immediately crucial as the revenue bill, the education bill, the tariff bill," the senator says with a suggestion of irony.

It is a fact that we are having the warmest consideration of a tariff bill known to fifty years of senate history. Frequently an entire day is spent in debating some trifling amendment. The senate meets from 11 a. m. to 10 p. m. or later every day during the discussion of this bill.

"Nothing could be more futile and ridiculous it seems to me," said Senator Capper, "than the present immense demonstration of the senate's inefficiency under its outward rule which have come down to us from a time that regarded the stage coach as the prime of human achievement in speed."
