## CLEVELAND BARN DESTROYED

The big red barn on the Cleveland ranch four miles above Heppner on upper Willow creek, generally known as the Hager ranch, was totally destroyed by fire last Wednesday morning together with all the contents except two horses that were saved by Mrs. Cleveland who was alone at the house when the fire started. The barn was lighted by electricity and it is believed defective wiring may have caused ignition of the building.

Mr. Cleveland and his men were at work some distance from the house when the fire started and by the time they reached the barn the flames were beyond control. The building carried \$2500 insurance, the contents about \$800.00 but Mr. Cleveland estimates his loss at several thousand dollars above those amounts. Mr. Cleveland purchased the ranch, which is one of the best improved stock ranches in the county, from C. A. Minor about three years ago. Last year Mr. Cleveland lost a large amount of stacked hay by fire.
