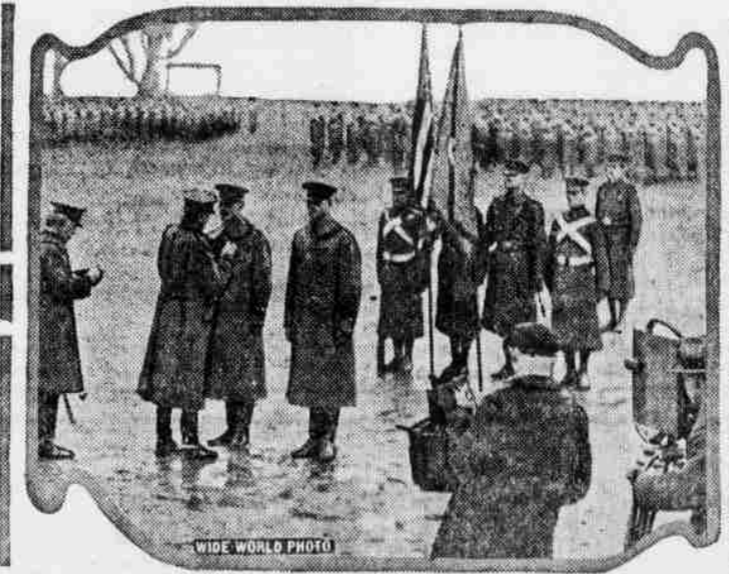

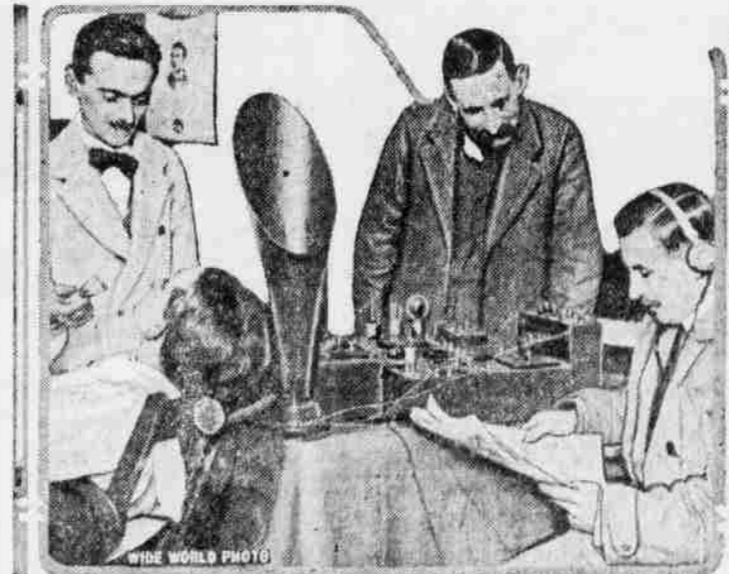

**Decorating Officers of Culver**



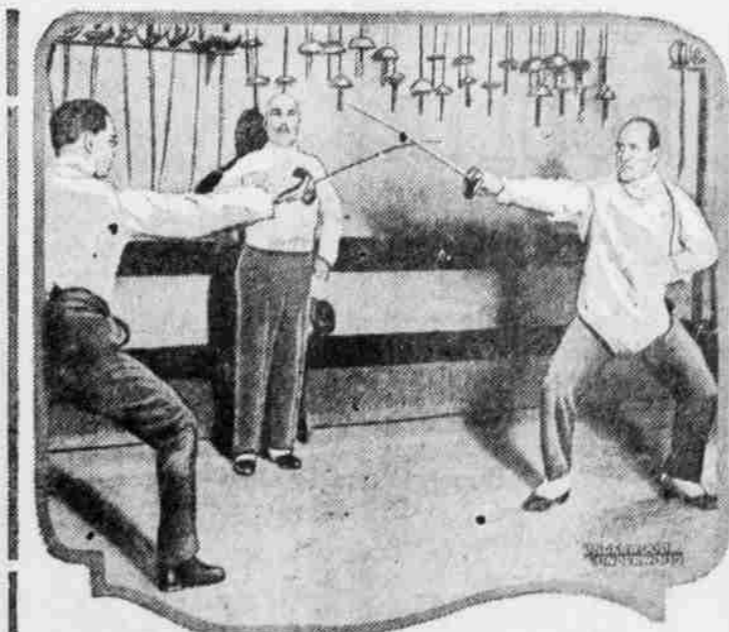

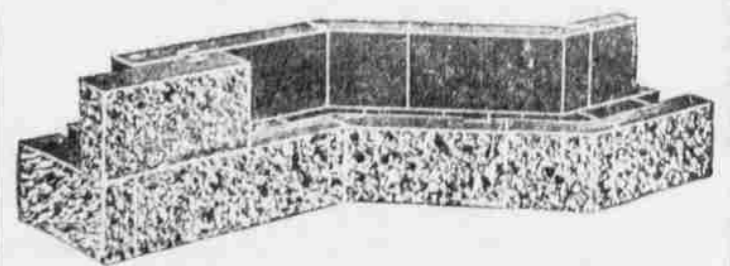
