CONDON FAST BECOMING WOOL MARKETING CENTER

"Wool is being assembled in Condon from the interior. It is coming in from the John Day county by trucks. I imagine there are about 1,500,000 or more pounds of wool now in Condon, and more coming," says G. M. Blakely, sheepman of Monument, Or., who is registered at the Imperial. "In the old days it took considerable time to haul wool with wagons. The old-time wagon freighters are scarce and I have only seen one such outfit this year. The wool is transported in motor trucks and there is keen competition among the truckmen for the business. It is cheaper for the sheepmen to have these truckmen handle the wool than it is for him to do it himself. Be-

sides, the wool can be gotten into Condon without the risk of being rained on. Wool is hauled almost from Prairie City to Condon over the John Day highway, although there is a narrow gauge railroad from Prairie to Baker. It costs about the same to get the wool to Portland over the highway as it does to send it out from Prairie to Baker. Most of the wool at Condon will be shipped through Portland to the east, being sent by water from this port. Only a small amount of wool remains unsold in the hands of growers,"—Oregonian.

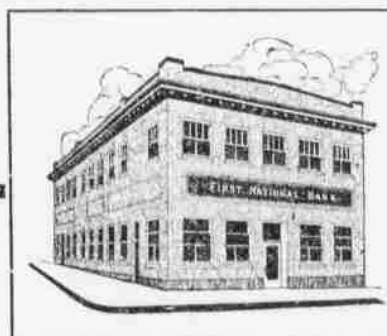
