FORMER HEPPNER PASTOR KNEW PRESIDENT LINCOLN

In the latest issue of the Union Pacific Magazine is a picture of Rev. Stephen Phelps with a short sketch of his life.

Rev. Phelps is the father of A. M. Phelps, of this city, and was for a time pastor of the Federated church here. He is now residing at Vancouver, Washington.

Concerning the pastor, the magazine article says:

"Reverend Stephen Phelps, one of the founders, and first president of Coe College, Cedar Rapids, and now a Presbyterian minister, remembers well the Lincoln-Douglas debate. His father and Abraham Lincoln had been young men together and a fast friendship had sprung up between them. Lincoln was a frequent visitor at the Phelps home and young Stephen often blacked the boots of their distinguished guest. He says of Lincoln, 'I love to remember that, just before he delivered his speech in the senatorial debate with Judge Stephen A. Douglas, he took my hand in his and looked down into my very soul with his wonderful eyes, and said, 'God bless you, my boy.'"

Rev. Phelps was an intimate friend of many of the prominent Union Pacific officials at Council Bluffs, and A. M. tells the story of how, when his father and mother were about to leave Council Bluffs for Heppner a few years ago, Mr. Phelps called at the office of one of the high officials to say goodbye. "So you are going to Heppner," said the railway man. "What train are you taking?" Mr. Phelps told him the number of the train, explaining that he could not take the faster train because it did not stop at Heppner Junction. "Never mind that," replied the railroader, "you take the fast train and I'll see to it that it stops at Heppner Junction." Mr. Phelps took the fast train and before reaching Pendleton the conductor told him that he would have to stop over at that town and catch the local, as his train would not stop at the Junction. "No," replied the preacher, "I will not get off at the Junction, but I will get off at the Junction." "Well, you will not get off at the Junction," replied the conductor, rather huffy, "because I cannot stop this train there." "Oh, yes you can," replied the preacher, smilingly.

Just after the train passed Hermiton the conductor came along and said: "Who are you, anyway? I just got orders to let you off at the Junction."
