THE WHEAT BELT REBELLION

The radical political twister in Minnesota has passed on, leaving Magnus Johnson high and dry in the senate and the wreckage of the Republican and Democratic machines of the state in its wake, with the result that seasoned politicians in Washington are looking forward, we are told by Robert T. Small in the Rochester Herald, "to the most chaotic presidential campaign the country has ever known." "The Minnesota election is what may be called part of an agrarian revolt," believes Senator Moses, of New Hampshire, chairman of the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, who sees "disaster if this move spreads." Moreover, this Republican senator believes, after first-hand observations in the middle west during the Johnson-Preus campaign, "the revolt will spread like smallpox into at least five adjacent states," and one of its results will be "a formidable third party" in the coming campaign, says Literary Digest.

Already, reports a Wichita correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, "discontent is general throughout the middle west, but in Kansas it seems to be a lap or two ahead of Minnesota." "Low farm prices" is given as the main cause "and the business men in the smaller communities, whose trade has been 'shot to pieces' by curtailed purchasing power, are in the same humor as the farmers." "No one can tell what may happen before this movement is halted," observes Representative Wood, of Indiana, chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, who agrees with Senator Moses that the political revolt fanned into flame by the Johnson victory will spread over the central west.

Negotiations are already under way in Minnesota, says a St. Paul dispatch to the New York American, "looking to a consolidation of the Farmer-Labor and Democratic parties in a determined effort to wipe the Republican party off the map in Minnesota."

While Senator Moses, in his pilgrimage, found much of the discontent due to the low price of wheat, he also ascribes much of the farmers' troubles to taxation, for which he finds the state, county and municipal authorities largely to blame. Said the senator on his return to Washington: "I can't help thinking this dissatisfaction is going to spread. I was in five states in the west and I talked to a great many people. My conclusion is that we have not heard the last of this thing by a long shot. In the territory that's likely to be affected by this movement the Republicans next year will have to fight for senate seats in Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Oregon, Minnesota, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Montana and Wyoming. All of these seats, except one in Montana, are held by sitting Republicans. It does not take any gifted mathematician to see how readily we can meet disaster if this move spreads."

PIERCE SUPPORTER NOMINATES BOOTH

J. E. Hunt, of Portland, but formerly engaged in business at Condon for several years, wrote a letter to the Oregonian a few days ago in which he suggests the name of Senator R. A. Booth for the Republican nomination for United States senator. The letter, which is of considerable interest in view of the number of hats belonging to aspirants for the senatorial toga which are being tossed into the ring, follows:

During the political campaign in Oregon last year a very great wrong was committed against Robert A. Booth and his fellow highway commissioners by many largely aggravated and almost libelous charges brought against them of inefficiency, waste, etc., and I regret to say that I "joined the rabble" in these charges because of my partisanship for a candidate for governor whose political affiliations were contrary to his. Now in the light of subsequent reliable information given the public I feel that such vicious and unwarranted attacks should be acknowledged and apologized for to Mr. Booth and his fellow commissioners, both by those who conceived and those who uttered them.

All of the members of the commission from the date of its formation to the date of Mr. Booth's retirement were of the highest type of honorable and constructive men in our midst and their successors are no improvement on them. The results of their activities (the great highway system of the state), will be a monument to their wisdom, skill, judgment and honesty for ages to come. Mr. Booth, having been made the center of the attack against the commission, showed his superiority over most men in his devotion to his trust when he agreed to retain his office (which carried no salary or emoluments) for some months at the beseeching solicitation of the man who had most publicly made the infamous charges against him.

Now as a recompense to him I suggest that we nominate and elect Robert A. Booth as United States senator at the coming election and I assure you we will be represented in Washington by the best equipped man for the office in this state. I knew him in three sessions of our legislature at a time when money by the thousands and political power and pelf at the maximum were almost thrust upon the members, and Robert A. Booth emerged from it all free from the remotest suspicion of its contaminating influences and in statesmanship he had but few peers and was always found upon the side of the decent, law-abiding element of society in the legislation enacted. He has had many years of public life since then and is now better qualified for successful service in the United States senate than ever before, and I hope someone quite prominent in politics will come forth as a leader in such movement and we will make last year's democratic landslide appear like a deserted brickyard when the votes are counted.

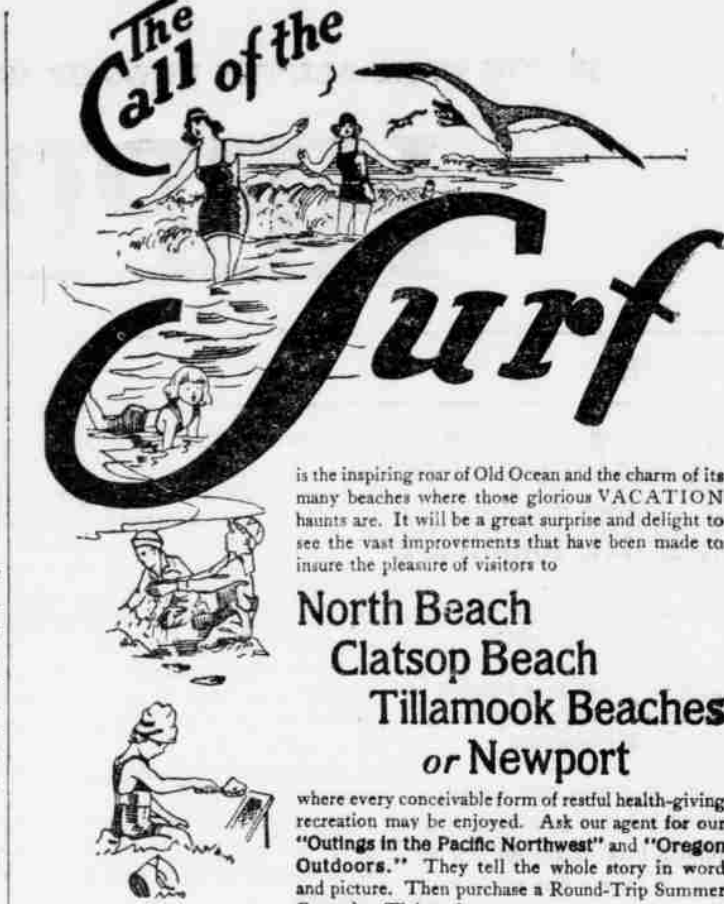
