

ANCESTOR OF GARDEN GREENS

Sea Cabbage a Weed That Grows Wild Near Dover and Sometimes Is Eaten.

If you are walking on the chalk cliffs near Dover you may notice a tall weed with pale yellow flowers which begins to bloom in May and continues to do so right through the summer. It grows about two feet high and has leaves of a deep green tinged with yellow and purple.

This homely looking plant is the sea cabbage, and is actually the ancestor of all our garden greens, cabbages, cauliflower, broccoli and the various kales. It is, or was, very common on the Dover cliffs and is sometimes collected and the leaves stripped off and boiled.

Many of the vegetables we cultivate in our gardens come from the coast, where their ancestors still grow wild, says London Tit-Bits. The sea beet grows in many places on the shore, and has green blossoms and thick, waxy leaves. But the thick, red, fleshy root has been obtained only by centuries of cultivation.

Sea kale is purely a maritime plant, and this is proved by the fact that a little salt—not too much—is an excellent fertilizer for the cultivated variety.

Celery grows wild on marshy ground on the shores of salt-water estuaries and asparagus is a native of similar land. Both these, when grown in gardens, can be stimulated with a little salt.

The sea pea is not a common plant, but may be found in places growing on sunny banks a little above high-tide mark. It has butterfly-shaped blossoms and its pods contain peas which, if small, are quite pleasant to the taste.

HERE'S USEFUL GAS LIGHTER

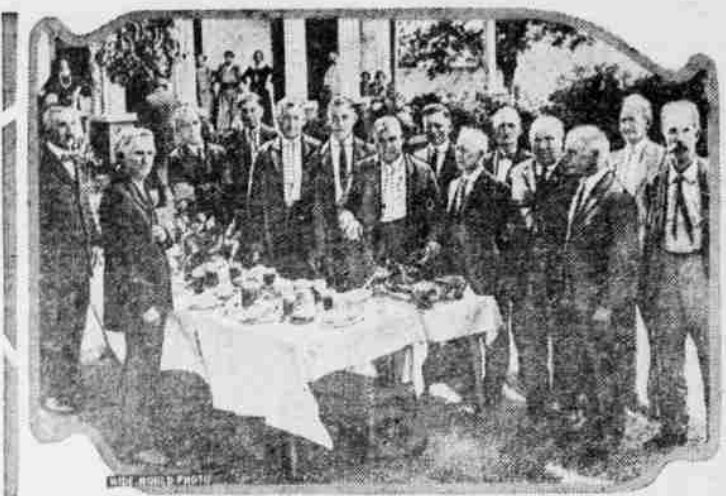
Rod Tipped With Iron Alloy That Emits Sparks When It Is Rubbed.

An eminent scientist discovered some years ago that a certain iron alloy on being lightly rubbed with a file, would emit intensive sparks that instantly ignite gas.

The practical application of this discovery consists of a metal rod holding on its top a little piece of this alloy. On the lower end of the rod is a button which on being pressed, rubs the alloy against a rough surface, and the spark is emitted. Up-right and inverted lamps may thus be ignited.

Another very useful application of this principle is seen in a stove.

fighter. The alloy is fastened on the end of the lower leg which, on being pressed upward, rubs against a vertical roughened surface. In releasing the hand pressure the lower leg jumps back to its original position by means of the springlike action of the rod, thus causing the alloy to spark violently.

It is even possible to light gas lamps at the top of masts, merely by turning the cock, a slight gas pressure starting a mechanism to light it. The alloy itself is practically indestructible and very cheap.

RELIEF FOR GERMAN CHILDREN SOUGHT

Work of Committee in Oregon Directed By Hoover Campaign Head.

Robert H. Strong, of the Portland firm of Strong & MacNaughton, who directed the campaign for foods for starving peoples of Europe for Herbert Hoover here in 1921, has accepted the chairmanship of the Oregon state committee for the relief of starving German children. This is affiliated with the American Committee for Relief of German Children, of which Major-General Henry T. Allen, who commanded the American forces on the Rhine during the occupation, is chairman for the United States. It is backed by Herbert Hoover, former Oregon boy, now secretary of commerce, and is endorsed by President Coolidge and was likewise endorsed by the late President Harding.

The Oregon committee is to launch soon a campaign to raise \$100,000 in this state, half in Portland and half in the out-state districts. Headquarters for the work have been opened in 715 Corbett building, Portland, with H. L. Eddy in charge as director. It has been endorsed locally by the Portland Council of Churches, the business interests of the city and by the Central Labor Council, all of which have declared that, whatever may have been done to bring about starvation conditions in Germany, certain it is that the little children there should not be blamed and that they must be fed and clothed.

SAVE GERMAN CHILDREN

Strong Oregon Committee Works For Relief Fund.

For the purpose of raising \$100,000 in Oregon as a part of a fund of \$1,000,000 from the United States to save 2,000,000 little children in Germany who are facing starvation because of the terrible conditions there, a strong committee has been named in Portland to look generally after this work throughout the state and particularly in that city. In the other larger cities of the state committees will be named to take charge of the relief work. Portland is state headquarters, with offices in room 715 Corbett building, where H. L. Eddy is in charge as director.

Robert H. Strong, of the firm of Strong & MacNaughton, is state chairman. He had charge of the Hoover food relief campaign in Oregon in 1921, when that campaign was put on to relieve distress in Europe. The committee which has sponsored the relief work in Oregon consists of men prominent in various lines of business, as follows:

E. Wheeler, publisher Portland Telegram.

Executive committee: Arthur M. Churchill; Marshall N. Dana, associate editor Oregon Journal; S. L. Eddy, Ladd & Tilton bank, treasurer for the state committee; Kurt H. Koehler, E. C. Sammons and Mr. Strong.

Every cent of the money subscribed for this fund will actually go to buy food.

Oregon people are asked this year to express their holiday and New Year spirit by giving something to relieve the suffering of more than two million starving German children. With unemployment common, the mark currency valueless, government disorganized, business at a standstill, a winter of famine, disease and terror confronts the German people. The scourge is falling heaviest on the children; the children with whom we have had no quarrel; the children who could not be blamed for any wrongs.
