Would Improve Masonic Cemetery

Frank Gilliam is heading a movement having for its object needed improvements at the Masonic cemetery. A new iron fence is to be erected this spring and Mr. Gilliam was in conference with County Judge Campbell yesterday on the proposition of building a macadam grade from town to the cemetery, his plan being for the county, the city and citizens to co-operate in the work. Judge Campbell estimated, roughly, that it would require about 1,000 yards of crushed rock to complete the job at a cost of about \$2500.00. The grading would be an inexpensive job it is believed.
