

The Good Roads Campaign.

We are fairly in the swing of the good roads campaign, which promises to amount to something. It is a campaign that deserves a boost from every source, because the things to be achieved are fairly well agreed upon, and they represent advance in this state in the good roads movement. Advance is what we want. There is nothing gained by standing still.

There is no state in the Union wherein the need for a practical and efficient good roads propaganda is greater than it is in Oregon. We are concentrating our energies, as it were, on those plans which will help most effectually toward the development of the agricultural resources of the state; and more especially along the lines of the small farm, intensively handled. This is a policy of exploitation and state development that makes the demand for good roads all the greater. As a matter of fact its success depends in large measure upon the progress we shall make toward the betterment of the state and county highways.

Upon the general need of good roads there has been much education in the state. There can be but few people in Oregon who do not appreciate the value of well-built highways to the communities they serve. The present campaign does not touch this fundamental as much as does the question of method—the practical manner in which we shall proceed to realize the thing that we are after, and the necessity that exists for citizens every where to inform themselves concerning the merits of the plan proposed, so that it may be not only placed on the ballot for adoption by the people of the state, but that it may be fully and clearly understood.

The people of Oregon are at last in a fair way to join the head of the column in the good roads movement. It is all resolved to a question of earnest consideration on the part of the voters.
