The date of the Seventh Annual Fair of the Third Eastern Oregon Agricultural Society is set for September 23 to 28. That time is not far off. The exhibit from Morrow county so far has not put in its appearance and those who are interested in giving our section a good boost at the fair realize the necessity of getting busy. Farmers, stockmen, get busy and collect the best you have from crops and flocks, bring your stuff to D. O. Gurdane at Heppner or deliver to J. T. Knappenberg at Lane and it will be looked after. Remember that the Tri-county fair follows the Morrow Umatilla fair and all grains and other non-perishable products can be shipped from Pendleton to Condon and thus save you the work of gathering two exhibits. Morrow county has never failed to carry away the majority of premiums at Pendleton and there is no reason why an exhibit this year should not prove superior to previous exhibits. Pick out your best samples of grain, grasses, fruit, vegetables, in fact anything that goes to make a suitable exhibit. Mr. Gurdane has on hand a large supply of premium lists which he is mailing out to Morrow county people as he can and if you have not yet received a copy you can get one at the store of Hendrickson & Gurdane. \$2000.00 will be distributed in cash premiums this year. These premiums are offered for agricultural, mineral and stock exhibits, works of art, fancy work, and other novel features. It is well worth your time to select an exhibit and see that it goes into the Morrow county booth at Pendleton. Thousands of people will be there to take in the fair and the Round-up and among them will be many Eastern people who are always anxious to see what the Western country raises. Not a few of these people take samples home with them and thus an inexpensive bit of advertising is done that counts for more than any highly colored literature sent out. Get busy friends and show the outside world that Morrow county is the place where real show stuff is raised.

If you are a patron of the motion picture show you have, no doubt, read the sign: "If our show pleases you, tell others; if not, please tell us." That sentence contains good business sense that should be applied to other lines of business as well as the show. If your grocer, butcher, merchant, barber, laundryman, in fact every place with which you do business, should be dealing you out a brand of goods or giving you service which does not appear right to you, you owe it to that party to tell him your grievance. Don't tell every Tom, Dick and Harry you meet on the street that so and so isn't square, or that his service no longer meets your approval, but go to that party and tell him your grievance. Any sensible business man will appreciate your effort and no doubt will profit by it. He is the one who should know that his service is not satisfactory, and by telling him whether it pleases or not you will be giving him an opportunity to correct his mistakes before others become dissatisfied and quit doing business with him.

FROM OVER THE STATE.

Complete instructions have been sent out by Secretary Chapman of the Oregon Development League to the commercial bodies of the state having membership in the organization, directing the collection and shipment of fine grains, grasses, fruits, and vegetables will be assembled at Portland and when shipped to the Oregon State Immigration Commission, Commercial Club Building, Portland they will be carried by the railroads without freight charges.

Many sections of Oregon are busy making a collection to ship to the Portland headquarters and it is expected the state will be able to make a strong showing, both at Chicago and Minneapolis. The Pacific Northwest Land Products Show at Portland will also attract exhibits of soil wealth, not only from this but from neighboring states.

Farmers who have samples of their crops they can send in for exhibit may get full directions either from their nearest Commercial Club or by addressing C. C. Chapman, Portland Commercial Club.

The Oregon State Fair will celebrate its 51st birthday this year with the biggest and best showing of Oregon products ever gathered. Not only are the crops so excellent that fine exhibits may be made but new departments will be added for the first time. Among these are the competitive showing of farm products grown by school children of the state and the exposition of Eugenics, both of which are arousing wide interest.

President W. C. Brown, of the New York Central lines told Portland people the past week that while the farms of the country have increased their products 38 per cent, consumption of the necessities has increased 60 per cent during the past ten years and unless some remedy is found to equalize the two the people of the United States will face a crisis before long. He urged the need of improved agricultural methods.

Loganberry culture, a new industry, is growing to large proportions in this state. At Brooks alone, 34,000 crates were shipped to a Portland cannery, netting the owners \$31,000. A total of 37 cars of loganberries was shipped from Brooks this year. The acreage given to this fruit is constantly on the increase. One man will set 200 acres in Polk county during the Fall and plans to install canning, drying and bottling machinery.

Hotel men of the state have launched a campaign to attract Eastern tourists to Oregon. At a recent meeting of the state association, it was decided to carry on extensive advertising and publicity work thru-out the East to show the scenic beauties of the Pacific Northwest to the intending traveler. It is the plan to distribute many folders and pieces of attractive literature illustrating this subject.

The population of Oregon is to be increased between 30,000,000 and 35,000,000 this year only the newcomers are young salmon and not people. That number of baby salmon will be liberated into the streams of the state from the various hatcheries. The fish, when released, will be from five to eight months old and are expected to be able to fight their own battles thereafter.

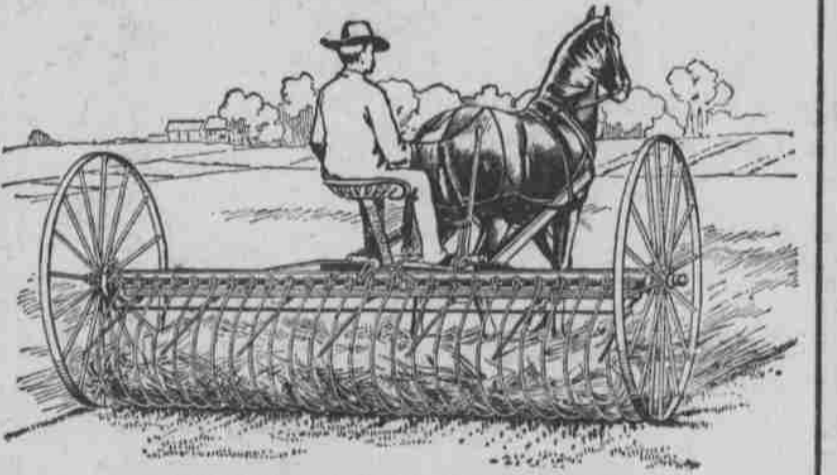
