### A BAD RECORD.

Representative Mann, of Illinois, a republican member of the popular branch of congress, characterizes its work this year as disorganized, inactive, inefficient and unprogressive. The characterization is severe, but study of the record will convince the country that it is not unjust.

An overshadowing question when the session opened last December was the revision of the tariff. The president last summer had warned congress that, unless it based its future action on the reports of the tariff board that it had itself created, he would repeat his veto of hammer-and-hatchet revisions made for politics only.

They also started with lofty professions of economy, but this boast likewise went by the board. They passed the largest grant of money for pensions that has ever been proposed and afterward abandoned all efforts for economy.

The lower house also tried to destroy the merit system in the civil service of the federal government, and employed the trick of putting "riders" on legitimate legislation to an extent never known before.

### PAYING THE PRICE.

The Blue Mountain Eagle, of Canyon City being somewhat agitated over conditions in Grant county, has this to say:

"Since Sheriff Collier has been in office Albert Green was killed. He was drunk. Oliver Snyder was killed. He was killed by drunks. A Greek man was killed at Dixie. He was killed by a drunk. Sweek was killed, and he was killed by a drunk. Barnes was killed when both he and his slayer were drinking Crowley was killed. He was drunk and was killed by a man who was drunk. There are five men, Elmer Shields, Earl Shields, Bert Green, Ben Hinton and Joe Cassaday in the penitentiary for life, and they were drunk when they killed Snyder. These men were either heads of families, fathers, husbands or brothers, and those upon whom the sorrow or shame fell represent more than one hundred of Grant county's citizens.

Gov. West is stirring things down at Portland and some of the municipal rottenness is being exposed. The governor may be somewhat of a freak, and his activity in cleaning up some of the towns and cities of the state is very much out of the ordinary but he is showing those who are elected to uphold law and decency that there is something for them to do, and he expects them to do it.

It takes radical movements of this nature sometimes to arouse our citizens, and if those who are elected to enforce the laws in the local communities will not do their duty and allow conditions to exist and illegitimate businesses to flourish in which it is proved they are profit sharers, then it is time for some higher authority to step in and call a halt. The governor is "doing things" to some of the smaller towns, as well, and the crusade may not be confined to just the large places.

Election returns from both Vermont and California this week are straws showing which way the wind blows. The Bull Moosers were a poor third in the former state, and in the latter their hopes have gone down before the big Taft vote. There is no reason to believe that Roosevelt will be anywhere near a winner in the Fall election. His attempt to wreck the Republican party is doomed to fail.
