French Blue, English Salmon and English Ermine Faverolles. Their origin is France, but the Engfish rooster tinkers claim to have


made some improvement and thus attach their trademark to two varieties. The distinctive characteristics of the breed are the whiskers, five toes and feather leggings.

The whiskering does not grow up over the eyes to obscure the vision as in some bearded breeds and is a distinct advantage in winter, as it protects against cold. The fifth toe is not so useless as with the Houdan and Dorking, but is useful for extra licks in garden destruction.

Faverolle chicks are hardy and mature rapidly, the pullets maturing early

rolled as a cigarette.



First Lightning Rod.
