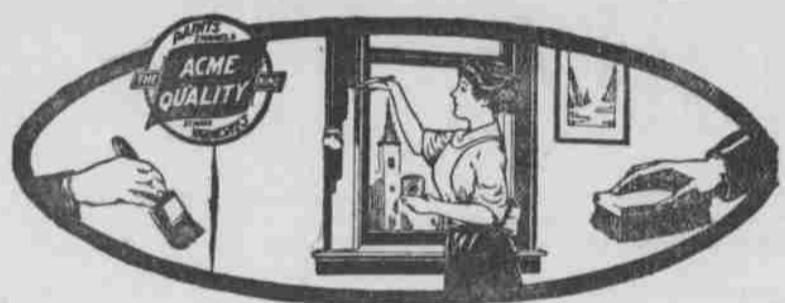

gallons of water; use two bars yellow
laundry soap and 1/2 pound concentrated
lye. Spray before fruit gets larger
than hazel nuts; spray again in three
weeks, and spray from firs to tenth
of July.
