Willis Scott Duniway, State Printer of Oregon since 1906, died suddenly at an early hour last Wednesday morning in Portland, of valvular disease of the heart from which he had been a sufferer for many years.

Mr. Duniway belonged to a distinguished family. His gifted mother, Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, is perhaps the best known woman on the Pacific coast. His four brothers are each of them prominent in their several callings.

He was born in Clackamas county Oregon 57 years ago and was a life long citizen of his native State. In 1906 he was first elected State Printer and at the end of his term was re-elected to the same office. He was a wise and conscientious public servant and instituted many reforms and economies that saved large sums to the State. "He was very much in earnest in his efforts to secure reforms in the public printing and succeeded over strenuous and often acrid opposition."
