Harvest is now in full blast in Sherman county. Weather conditions are considered favorable at present though still quite warm in the northern part of the county near the Columbia river. The average expectation of fall sown grain is in the neighborhood of ten to twelve sacks to the acre. The spring sown grain will come considerably under that estimate, says the "Moro Observer."

The strawberry season has come to a close in Hood River valley and the records show that 109 car loads were shipped from there this season, the largest number of cars ever shipped from there in one year. The highest price paid was \$6 a crate, and the minimum price \$2.25.
