The spring salmon fishing season on the Columbia river, which just closed, will be the poorest in many years. This is especially true of the lower river district. Plants on the upper river did much better.

A conservative estimate of the amount put up places the canned pack at 230,000 cases, "as they run" or approximately 149,500 full cases. This pack represents 9,000,000 pounds of raw fish. The cold-storage pack totals about 3450 tierces of 800 pounds of cured fish, or a total of 4,895,000 pounds.

Owing to the effect of the hot weather and drought upon the corn crop of Kansas farmers and stock men of that state have petitioned congress to entirely remove the duty on corn so it can be imported and fed their stock. A saving of ten cents a bushel is anticipated. If the request is granted, Kansas state grain inspectors office estimates that one-tenth of a crop will be harvested this season.

BAD ROADS A COST TO THE FARMERS.

How states and counties are putting money into the pockets of the farmers by investing in the improvement of public roads is shown by a statement just issued by the Office of Public Roads in the Department of Agriculture. Definite cases are cited in support of the argument that where bad roads prevail farmers are forced to move their crops not when the market price is favorable, but when the roads are favorable.

Two farmers living in separate counties but at an equal distance from the cotton market, learned by telephone that cotton had advanced in price \$1.00 per bale. The farmer living on a bad road responded by hauling one bale of cotton, which was all he could get over the unimproved road, while the other farmer was able to haul four bales, owing to favorable road conditions. The rise in price gained a profit of \$4.00 to one man, and \$1.00 to his neighbor.

It is common for the farmer to find that he can not haul his produce to market when prices are highest, because the roads are impassable. When the roads become passable, the time for market has largely passed and produce is compelled to move in masses, which frequently glut the market and breaks the prices.

Excessive fluctuations in market prices are seldom due to over-production. They frequently take place in regions where the local production does not equal the annual consumption. There are counties rich in agricultural possibilities, burdened with bad roads, where the annual income shipments of food-stuffs exceed the outgoing shipments in the ratio of four to one. Many such counties with improved roads could not only become self-supporting but could ship products to other markets.

A farmer living a few miles from a city of 6,000 inhabitants had 100 bushels of Irish potatoes which he intended to market during the winter. Owing to bad roads he was unable to haul the potatoes at all, and they rotted in the cellar. Nevertheless the price of potatoes in the home market went as high as \$1.40 per bushel in the meantime. A merchant of that city stated that during the winter as many as 10 carloads of farm produce, including wheat, potatoes, and other supplies, were daily shipped in, when at the same time farmers in the immediate neighborhood had their produce spoiling on their hands, all on account of impassable roads.
