## SCHOOL NOTES.

The teachers' institute for this county will be held, Sept. 17, 18, 19. These dates are not convenient in many respects, but in order to have the assistance of the State Superintendent and the special instructor in the Palmer Method of writing and also to save something on the traveling expenses of other instructors, it was necessary to accept the dates. Some of the schools will not be in session at that time, but all teachers should attend the institute in order to entitle them to the credit and give the district the proper claim for the apportionment for the attendance of the teacher. If a school has not opened, it is right for the district to make the allowance for the time of attendance of the teacher just the same. There will be a strong corps of instructors, and we hope to make the institute very profitable. The work in writing, in accordance with the new system, will be well worth the time of every teacher.

Let me make a final appeal to the pupils of the school to do something toward an exhibit at the fair. Look through the premium list and see what you have which will be eligible for entry. It may be that you have something good which is not listed. If so, bring it any way. That will give the fair board a chance to make a more complete premium list next year and will also help to make the fair success. While the premium should not be lost sight of yet we should have in mind that we want to make the fair the best we can. If you have not obtained a premium list write to the Secretary W. W. Smead at once.

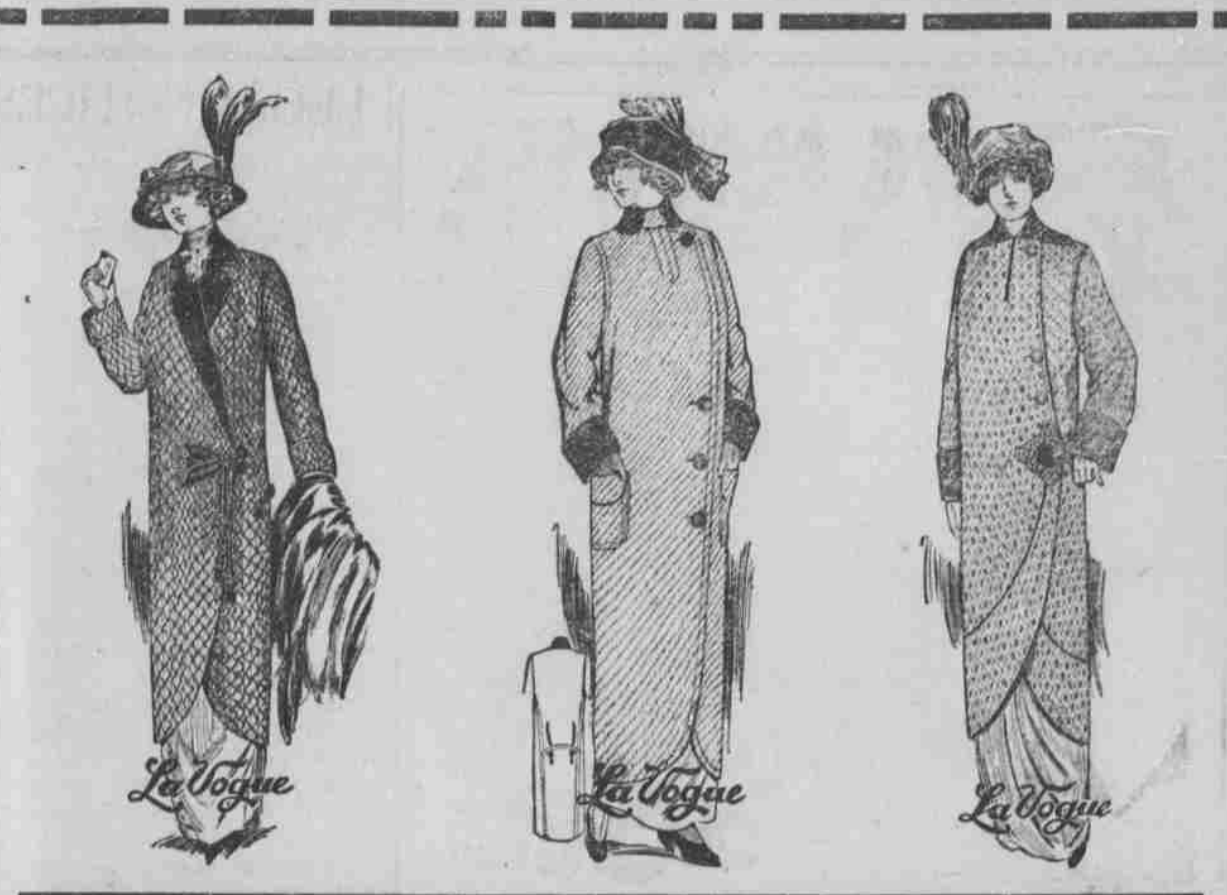
