LAFE PENLAND IS HURT IN ACCIDENT

Three Other People Are Injured When Buggy is Capsized.

Lafe Penland, a well known stock man of this city was seriously injured and three other occupants in the same buggy were badly bruised in a runaway at the top of Heppner Hill last Monday evening about 5 o'clock.

Mr. Penland left Heppner for his ranch in company with his daughter, Mrs. Pearl Cox, and Mrs. Floyd and daughter. They were barely on top of Heppner Hill and going down the canyon on the other side when a young mare which Mr. Penland was driving, suddenly began to kick. She was uncontrollable, and after getting over the tongue both horses started to run. The buggy, which was on a high grade at the time, turned turtle and it was in this turn that the occupants were thrown out and injured. Mr. Penland received internal injuries and up to this time it has been impossible to bring him to town. The ladies received only minor injuries, and with the exception of a few bad bruises escaped unhurt.

The buggy was smashed to pieces and the horses were not found until late the next day.

Mrs. Floyd is a young woman whom Mr. Penland had engaged as a cook on one of his ranches.
