Notice of Estimated Expenses and Proposed Tax Levy for Morrow County, Oregon, for the Year 1914.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on Thursday, the 4th day of December, 1913, the County Court of Morrow County, Oregon, will be in regular session at the Court House in Heppner, Oregon, and any taxpayer of Morrow County, Oregon, will be heard in favor of or against the proposed tax levy as hereinafter itemized.

ITEMIZED STATEMENT.

Prepared in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 234 of the 1913 Oregon Session Laws, showing an estimate of the amount of money required to be raised by taxation by Morrow County, Oregon, for the year 1914, to maintain each department of the county government, county office or county officer, and for each county improvement, the maintenance of each county building; structure or institution, and for the salary of each county officer or employee, and for the improvement and maintenance of public highways, roads and bridges, and for other contemplated expenditures.

Also showing the probable receipts of Morrow County, Oregon, from sources other than direct taxation upon real and personal property for the year 1914, and also the amount of the balances of the various funds of Morrow County, Oregon, upon Nov. 1, 1913.
