SUPT. S. E. NOTSON VISITS SCHOOLS

Among the schools visited last week was the school in District No. 11, where Miss Katherine Owen is in charge. I noted that the school has a dictionary, set of maps and a globe. The library books are kept in a good book-case. Window boards are to be provided soon. Miss Owen has an excellent program posted in the room. It not only provides for the recitation periods, but also for the study periods, of each class.

The next school I visited was the Fairview school, which is under the direction of Miss Florence Pifer. This school is small this term. I noted that this school has four framed pictures. A good picture is an excellent thing in a school room, and when it is framed it is still more attractive.

In District No. 21 I found Miss Grace Stamp at the helm. There are excellent window boards for all the windows. The water supply is kept in a closed jar, fitted with a faucet, and the pupils have individual cups. A vessel of water is kept on the stove, thus insuring some moisture in the atmosphere.

Miss Beulah Wagner teaches in District No. 36, but had dismissed early in order to go to the station so she could reach home for Thanksgiving. This school is quite small this term. Window boards are provided for the windows.

Some of the teachers to whom the blanks asking for information were sent, received them too late to return them with their monthly reports.
