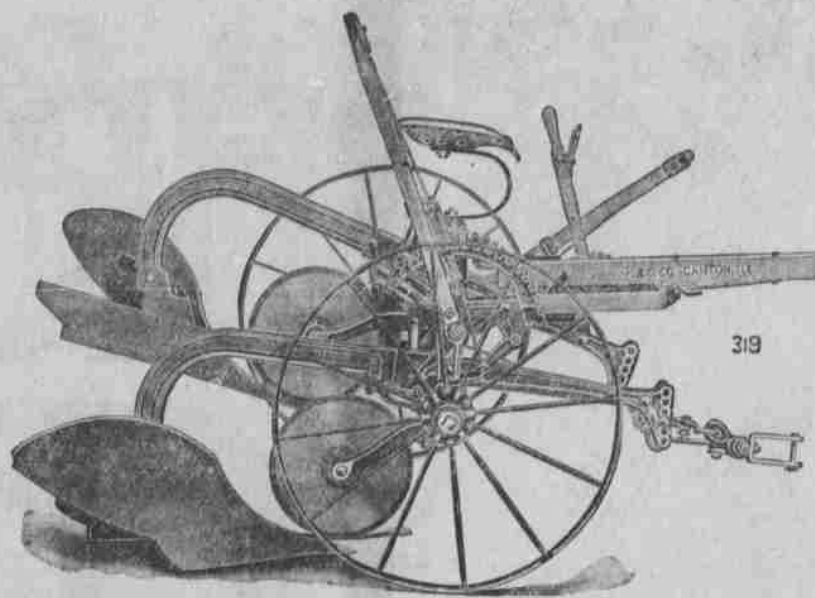
Burned Into Memory.
