Where is that proverbial cold snap for March? It has not hit Morrow county yet and we are willing to pass it up if it's just the same to the weather man.

C. A. Barrett, of Athena, the present joint senator from the 19th senatorial district, comprising Umatilla, Morrow and Union counties, will be a candidate for re-nomination. Mr. Barrett has made a fine record for himself during his incumbency of office and will no doubt be complimented with another term.

Another Morrow county boy has thrown his hat into the ring for political honors. Mr. J. O. Hager, of Heppner, will seek the nomination for county clerk at the hands of the republicans and his announcement will be found in the list of political aspirants elsewhere in this paper. Mr. Hager has lived all his life here at Heppner, is a splendid young man and should make a strong candidate. This gives us a three-cornered fight should there be no other aspirants, and the race should be an interesting one.

The Irrigon Road.

As stated in last issue, a party of Heppner citizens, consisting of Dr. N. E. Winnard, Supt. S. E. Notson, Vawter Crawford, A. M. Phelps and A. M. Slocum went over the road from Heppner to Irrigon to "spy out land." The trip was made on Wednesday last, the party reaching the home of Commissioner John Kilkenny for dinner, where they "filled up" on a good old fashioned meal prepared by Mrs. Kilkenny, and the way it was put out of sight by some of the party was wonderful to behold. Mr. Kilkenny joined the party here and went along to Irrigon to point out the survey.

It was found that a good road can be made across the sand with but little work. On reaching Irrigon, a meeting of the citizens there took up the question in earnest and proposed getting right to work on their end of the line and it will be noted by referring to the correspondence from there that they have already begun.

The county court is backing up the proposition and will support it right through. The county surveyor will make a new survey so that the road will be plainly marked, and by going over the route about two times with the grader the sage brush will be removed and then the rest will be easy. At a few points only will the drifting sands have to be overcome and this can be done with sage brush and straw.

After that the travel on the sandy end of the road will make a first rate road bed. From the mouth of Sand Hollow across the "banana belt" to Heppner there is nothing but good roads all the way until you get near Heppner and this part of the road could soon be put in excellent shape and no doubt it will be.

The little Ford of Dr. Winnard's made the trip all the way through the sand belt without any trouble but possibly could not do so at all seasons of the year with the roads in their present condition across the "desert".

The trip home on Thursday was made via Umatilla and Hermiston, and it was noted that some work was being done on the West Extension, one camp being near the river at Umatilla and another about a mile and a half out. It is expected that this work will be pushed right along and its early completion consummated.

Spring tins seemed to be at hand down that way and at Irrigon the peach trees and almond trees were fast preparing to burst into bloom, and were expected to be in full blossom
