## COMMERCIAL CLUB POT-POURRI

Heppner Commercial Club meets the first and third Fridays of each month in the I. O. O. F. hall.

The executive committee this week selected Rev. W. T. Goulder as secretary. Mr. Goulder has already assumed the duties of the office and with this matter settled, the Club will advance some of the work already outlined. Those holding membership cards will be conferring a favor upon the secretary by presenting them for his signature.

The feed which was planned for tomorrow evening has been postponed until Tuesday evening, March 10, on account of the presence of "Farmer" Smith on that evening. Anyone within reach of Heppner will find it profitable to come and hear this venerable sage of agriculture. The Club has not been informed of the subject he will talk on at this meeting, but whatever he will have to say will be worth listening to. The Club will furnish the feed at a nominal price. These special meetings are open to the public.

Next week is "Alfalfa Week" in the schools of the state. This is one of the moves toward higher development in Oregon which should receive the encouragement not only of the Commercial Club but of every patron of the school as well. In Iowa a few years ago the study of corn was injected into the school system of the state with the result that the total corn production of the state has been increased three per cent. Oregon can not become a leader in corn, but she can raise more alfalfa without shortening the production of other crops. Let us get down to careful study of local conditions and make improvements where the most good will result.

The membership list is still growing. Remember, the present plan of taking in members remains open until the first of April. It is easy to get in now, so don't put it off a day longer, but ask your merchant for a card and leave with him a dollar and a half.

The road committee visited Irrigon last week and returns with some interesting facts. Come out tomorrow evening and hear the report.

Don't forget that March 13 is "Salmon Day."

The poultry business is rapidly forging to the front in this vicinity. A Heppner man this week sold a thousand "setting" eggs to a Lexington man. No better poultry country to be found than right here in Morrow county.

Hog shipments from Heppner were nearly three times as great in 1913 as in 1912. A few years more of such gains and the hog will be king.

The Club has under consideration a clean-up day. This is a matter of genuine interest to the town. A well organized clean-up program will do much to stimulate an interest in civic beauty. In this line it might be considered right and proper to advocate the organizing of a ladies' auxiliary to co-operate with the Commercial Club in the work of beautifying the town. There are many things to be done before Heppner will look good to the stranger within the gates, and one of the first things is to show a disposition to work. The ladies have always shown exceptional ability in improvement work, and there is everything in favor of a good big ladies club at this time.

### SCHOOL NOTES.

District 18 has a very small school, only three pupils. Mrs. Edna White is the teacher. A new set of maps and a new globe have been purchased recently with the proceeds of a box social. New window shades have been provided, also, from this fund. I noted some excellent water color work which the pupils have done.

When I approached the school in District No. 20, I found the teacher, Miss Alice Arnold, and the pupils burning the sagebrush and trash which they had cleared off the school ground. This school has a flower garden coming on, some of the plants being several inches high. Some new charts have been purchased recently. A fine new flag floated from the staff. The pupils raised the money with which to purchase the flag.

At Irrigon I found Prof. L. B. Kicker and Miss Mabel Hill working enthusiastically with a wide-awake lot of pupils I was much pleased with the work being done by the class

## STATE INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS NOTES

The Meier & Frank stores at Portland are to be raised to twelve stories for the entire block which they occupy at a cost of \$1,250,000.

A committee of citizens of Drain in Northern Douglas county has inspected the Eugene canner and will proceed to act at Drain.

F. M. Fletcher has been on Coos Bay prospecting for the location of a Beaver Compo Board plant, a line of building material.

There is a general movement among sawmill men to resist encroachments of labor organizations and conduct their industries on open shop lines.

The \$60,000 public auditorium for Portland has at last been located on Market block.

Guy L. Anderson, general manager of the Sumpter Valley railroad, announces expenditures of \$100,000 on betterments of that line.

Toledo Lumber Co. shipped 450 carloads during 1913, and the city is to have an electric light and power station built at once.

Ashland prospectors have found a lithia water spring that has a flow of 25 gallons per minute and will bottle the product.

A modern vulcanizing plant will be installed at Salem, April 1st.

After long delays the S. P. Co. bridge across Coos Bay is at last agreed upon—to be of the swing-draw type.

The fight to make the State Printing office an open shop has been renewed by the Employers' Association of Portland.

A cheese factory is to be located at Halfway in the Pine valley by the Jensen Creamery Co., of Baker City.

The people of Orenco have voted to issue bonds for a municipal water plant.

The St. Helens Incubator Co. has a large order for incubators and brooders from an Eastern mail order house.

Last week I visited the Clarks Canyon school, which is under the direction of Mr. Frank Mattingly. A new map of the State and some new charts have been added to the equipment recently. The pupils are doing good work.

At the Alpine school, I found the teacher, Mr. E. W. Hamman, and twelve pupils busy at work. A new set of historical charts and a new International dictionary have been recently added to the equipment. A new organ was purchased a short time ago.

The next school in my line of march was the school in District No. 38. Miss Opal Briggs is the teacher. Some new charts, a new jacket for the stove, and a new desk for the teacher have been added since my former visit. This school has a good flag, which was displayed as provided by law. The work was moving along smoothly, and the pupils are interested in their work.

In District No. 50, the teacher, Mr. C. F. French, and 14 pupils were making preparations for an entertainment which will be given at the close of the school. If the practice indicates anything, the entertainment will be well worth attending. This school has a new set of historical charts. The windows are provided with excellent adjustable shades. They are made of canvas, and while they cost a little more, they will outwear several ordinary shades.
