

# Drugless Treatment of Typhoid.

The medical conclusion is that infectious diseases are self-limiting, (that is, they run a certain course and then terminate) but they cannot be either aborted (cut short) or cured by drugs. S., says: "The effects of our medicines on the human system are in the highest degree uncertain, except, indeed, that they have destroyed more lives than war, pestilence and famine combined." Another famous British doctor Sir Frederick Treves, physician to the king, speaking at the opening of a London hospital recently, said he believed the time is not far distant when they will "leave off the extraordinary habit of taking medicine when people are sick."

If I seem to quote Dr. Osler frequently, it is only because he is regarded as one of the best living authorities among medical writers and practitioners. Recently the publishers of his "Practice of Medicine" issued a statement to the effect that 117,750 copies of the several editions of his book have been sold. This means that of every five doctors four have bought this work—a pretty good evidence of Osler's standing and popularity among the profession. Here's a little of what he says about drugs in general: "It took the profession many generations to learn that fevers run their courses, influenced very little, if at all, by drugs. Of the difficulties inherent in the art, not one is so serious as this which relates to the cure of disease by drugs. The nineteenth century has witnessed a revolution in the treatment of disease and the growth of a new school of medicine. The battle against poly-pharmacy, or the use of a large number of drugs (of the action of which we know little, yet we put them into bodies of the action of which we know less), has not been fought to a finish."

I would not indiscriminately condemn all drugs, any more than I would say that all doctors who prescribe them are hypocrites and knaves. There are drug doctors in this town who have always been fair and honest in their dealings with the drugless doctors and there are those in our city who will take patients to the Heppner Sanatorium and refuse to let the parents call a drugless doctor to see the patient. After the drug doctors have said they could do nothing more for the patient they have refused to let the parents call a drugless physician. I have been requested and plead with by parents to go there and see their child and have been refused admission. I have gone there at the request of the nearest relatives, and the patient herself, and have been asked to leave the Sanatorium.
