Registration of the voters of Morrow county goes along slowly. Why not attend to this matter now and be lined up for the primaries? A good many, no doubt, are laboring under the impression that their registration of last fall is sufficient, but this is not so, and your name must appear on the new books. By registering now you save a lot of bother on election day should you wish to vote. Do it now.

In its issue of March 6, the Oregon Messenger, a democratic paper published in Salem has the following to say of Governor West's political ingenuity and terms the Kay affair as a contemptible piece of political trickery.

A more dirty, contemptible piece of political trickery was never perpetrated upon a respectable citizen of Oregon than that of which Thomas B. Kay, the present Treasurer of Oregon, though a modest man who cares little for notoriety or superfluous advertising, is a man known to be on the square in his dealings with the public, and every man in Oregon who has watched the trend of events at the State House during the past three years must admit, if he desires to be fair and honest, that Thomas B. Kay, present State Treasurer, has been the saving grace, the safeguard, the brains, the mainstay of the present administration. There may be some who doubt this statement, but everyone who has taken the trouble to keep in touch with the facts must admit its truth.

We are inclined to the belief that, when it comes to a showdown, the people of Oregon will know who has been their friend; will know that it has been the good horse sense and business judgement of the State Treasurer that have kept the Governor and some of his over-zealous lieutenants from carrying out numerous schemes that would have piled expense still higher and compelled greater deficits in the various public institutions.
