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COUNTY COURT MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION

Lexington Will Hold Local Option Election—Claims For Term Are Allowed And Ordered Paid—Road Petitions Read And Continued For Term.

County court met in the regular bi-monthly session at the court house last week and the following business was recorded in the journal for the term.

S. E. Notson allowed \$150 to defray the expenses of Morrow County Teachers' Institute.

GRANT COUNTY FARMER LOSES BARN AND GRAIN

Fire of Incendiary Origin Thought to be the Work of Enemies.

D. S. Flynn, who resides at the head of Reilman canyon on the Heppner-Ritter road in Grant county, suffered the loss of his barns and all of his grain crop one day the past week.

Mr. Flynn was absent from home at the time, but other members of the family were at the house which is situated at least a quarter of a mile from the barn. He had gone to a neighbor's to make arrangements to have his grain harvested and it would appear that his absence was noted by some one desirous of doing him injury, and the premises fired.

The fire spread so rapidly that it was impossible to quench it, and the barns and field of grain adjoining were totally destroyed.

It was Mr. Flynn who caused the arrest some few weeks ago of Wm. Stanley who was run in by Deputy Sheriff McDuffee, of Heppner, and who is now awaiting the sitting of the Grant county grand jury upon a charge of horse stealing. This case has engendered a lot of bad feeling against Mr. Flynn and while there is at this time no positive evidence that the friends of Stanley had anything to do with the burning of the premises of Flynn, there is strong suspicion that this is the case.

"ON TO HEPPNER" IS SLOGAN OF PROPOSED FAIR EXCURSION

PENDLETON BUSINESS MEN HAVE STARTED MOVE WHICH MAY RESULT IN COMING OF SPECIAL TRAIN TO MORROW COUNTY FAIR.

"On to Heppner" is the slogan now of many of the business men as the result of a move afoot to organize an excursion party to attend the county fair of Morrow county which is set for September 17, 18 and 19.

Judge G. W. Phelps suggested the idea and it found instantaneous and enthusiastic approval among many residents.

If the party is formed, it is proposed to start the train from Pendleton about 3 p. m. on Thursday, the 17th, and stop it for half an hour in Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston and Umatilla in order to pay those towns a short visit. The Junketers could then retire to their Pullmans and awake in the morning in Heppner. After spending the day there, they could return that night and arrive back in Pendleton Saturday morning.

The excursion to Heppner is a debt Pendleton owes to her neighbor city in the view of many of the business men. The people of Morrow county have been among the most enthusiastic supporters of the R and U and each year hundreds of them come to the Pendleton show. For many years when the local fair was a district institution, Morrow county annually sent over her exhibits and her crowds. The people there also do a great deal of trading in Pendleton and, altogether, there is a very close relationship between the two counties, which were formerly one.

In case the trip materializes, it will not interfere with the dates of the proposed excursion to Spokane.—Pendleton E. O.

Will Sail About the 12th.

In a letter received this week by E. D. Brown from R. F. Hynd, the latter states that he will sail on Sept. 11 or 12 for America and expects to arrive at his home in Portland by the last of this month. If nothing happens to prevent. He reports but little excitement in Scotland over the war, and aside from the fact that some troops are being mobilized and sent to the front, one would not be aware of anything unusual going on. William Garrett, alleged to be one of the cleverest horse thieves in the northwest and who escaped two years ago from the Nez Perce, Idaho, jail was this morning captured by Deputy Sheriffs Blakely and Estes at the Earnheart ranch north of this city. They had been on his trail for some time but he eluded them and went to Nevada. He returned, however, a few days ago. He will be returned to Nez Perce.—E. O., Sept. 8.

Is Severely Injured.

G. M. Calkins was severely injured at Ione on Monday afternoon by the "explosion" of an emery wheel which he was using at the time to gum out a wood saw. Parts of the emery stone struck him on the face, neck and breast, his jaw bone being broken in two places and laid bare, and a bad cut was also inflicted on his neck. He was rushed to the office of Dr. Chick who mended his injuries, after which Mr. Calkins was able to walk to his home.

State Veterinarian Will Send Man to Test Stock on 15th.

Seale brothers of Condon, fancy and trick riders, have been secured by the fair board to perform on the streets again, as they did last year. These boys have established a reputation in their line and there are few better. They are annual performers at the Pendleton Round-up, where they have taken prizes. We are fortunate in being able to get them here for the three days.

A representative of the State Veterinary office will arrive in Heppner on the evening of September 15, for the purpose of testing all cattle to be exhibited at the fair. It is necessary, if your cattle are exhibited, that they be tested, and the board urges that all cattle be in town not later than noon on September 16. No cattle will be permitted to enter as exhibits until they have passed the test required by law. There was no charge made for the cattle examination last year, and it is presumed there will be none this year.

Will Serve Lunch.

The ladies of the Christian church are putting in shape the north room of the fair store building and making ready to serve short order lunches during the three days of the county fair. They will be prepared to serve the public in approved style at reasonable prices and look forward to a good patronage.

BAD ROADS NEAR IONE CAUSES COLLISION

Serious Mix-up of Wheat Teams Near Ione Causes Considerable Damage.

Thursday while Glen Ball was driving one of Fred Griffin's wheat wagons down Grabill Hill he attempted to turn out for a returning team driven by Floyd Frasier, in some way the wheels of the loaded wagon refused to take the road and slipped into a deep rut and ran into the Floyd Frasier outfit scaring the six horses so that they got beyond control of the driver and ran away smashing another outfit driven by Mr. Morgan, who has the Key place. Both men were thrown in the first mix-up, Ball getting his leg hurt severely while Frasier suffered some slight injury. One of the mules belonging to Griffin had a leg broken and was shot. The second outfit suffered quite a bit of damage to the rig and the driver was shaken up severely. All of the wagons were more or less torn up and were brought back to Ione for repairs. Frank Everson stopped the horses and helped pull the rigs out of the mix-up.—Ione Journal.

Will Address Pioneers—State Horticultural Society Will Meet Here—Oregon Social Hygiene Society Will Have Exhibit.

The program for the Second Annual Fair is rapidly taking shape and by the end of this week will be practically completed as to the exact time and date.

Secretary Smead informs us that the State Board of Horticulture will hold its meeting during one of the days of the fair. The exact date has not yet been set. Every fruit grower in Morrow county is invited and urged to be present at this meeting. Several men, prominent in the fruit growing industry of Oregon will be here, and some excellent addresses and lectures will be given.

The Oregon Social Hygiene Society have written this week asking the Fair management that space be reserved for them, for their traveling exhibit. This exhibit is said to be educational and attractive.

On Friday, the 18th, Judge Galloway, democratic nominee for the Oregon Supreme bench, and Hon. R. A. Booth, republican candidate for United States senator, will address the Morrow county pioneers. Both of these men are Oregon pioneers and their reputation as public speakers has already been established. The Fair Board feel that they are fortunate in being able to secure these men for Pioneers' Day.

A special train will be run from Ione on Friday and Saturday, the last two days of the fair. The train will leave Heppner for the return trip at 12 mid-night. On the local train an extra coach will be provided during the three days.

W. E. Walbridge, county fruit inspector is now out in the country gathering exhibits of all kinds and the work of placing exhibits in the pavilion is now in progress under the direction of O. E. Freytag, secretary of the Oregon City Commercial Club.

The fair management expects a much larger attendance this year than last and is making preparations accordingly to take care of the visitors. All rooms for rent are being listed with the secretary. Henry Vance has this matter in his charge and he has established headquarters at the Palace hotel. If anyone has rooms for rent that have not yet been listed, they should notify the secretary at Fair headquarters at once.

Like last year, the baby show will again be one of the leading features of the fair. The judges have not been selected, but probably will be within the next few days. We are informed that the system of scoring will be the same as that used in the Better Babies contests, conducted by the Woman's Home Companion. The test will not be as severe as the one last year.

The Baby Show will be on the first day of the fair, Thursday, Sept. 17 at 2:30 p. m. All entries should be made promptly. The prizes will be first and second, and will consist of gold and silver baby cups of neat design.

Arrangements are being made in Pendleton to send a special train to Heppner for one day of the fair. Judge Gilbert W. Phelps has charge of the proposition and we can confidently expect a large delegation of Pendleton business men here for a part of the big events at least. Many of our citizens are writing to friends in Pendleton, urging them to come and bring as many of their friends as possible.
