fruits, preserves, bottled pickles, homemade soaps, fancy wick and flowers. Her display occupied one full table and was very artistically arranged and became the center of attraction of all visitors who greatly admired the excellence of the display and complimented Mrs. Servino highly upon the energy she displayed in bringing the exhibit together. We would recommend that many more of the women of this community emulate the example set by this lady and be prepared another season to present displays along the same line. It will add very materially to the success and interest of the fair.

A Farmer's Contribution.

Contributing to the individual displays, W. O. Bayless filled up one of the big tables with the mammoth pumpkins and squashes, melons, cabbages, turnips, beets, carrots, and potatoes. He also had corn in the ear and corn on the stalk, well developed and blue ribbon winners. Mr. Bayless makes a specialty of gardening and his display was equal to the best in the pavilion. Owing to the work of the grasshoppers the corn display in the stalks was a little shy at the tops, but the ears were there, and it was remarked by various people from the corn states that the specimens on display by Mr. Bayless could not be excelled. As usual, he had the biggest pumpkin on display.

The Stock Show Limited.

The stock show was somewhat disappointing for it was very limited and not at all up to what is should have been. There was evidently some misunderstanding at the office of the State Veterinarian, or else he purposely overlooked having a man on the ground here in time to make the proper tests so that the cattle entries could be made, and many who had brought stock were compelled to return home and the exhibition was greatly shortened thereby. Wightman Bros. had some fine displays of Duroc Jersey swine, and there was several pens of sheep, besides a number of fine horses and mules. Two pens of sheep were from the flocks of Alex Lindsay of Ione who presented some members of his "demonstration weeder" family of Oxford. A new litter of pigs, born on the grounds, demonstrated their ability to rustle a living and were the center of attraction of all visitors to the stock pens. It will be the endeavor of the Fair Board to offer such inducements another year as will bring out a stock show worthy to represent this great industry in Morrow county.

Much Fine Poultry.

In this section of the fair there was a large number of entries of fine chickens, fancy fowls, and birds, as well as numerous pairs of white rabbits. W. Claud Cox, of Heppner had the largest display, these being from his White Wyandotte farm, and consisted of 36 birds. He took sweepstakes for largest display, and after the fair closed he took his exhibit to Salem where they have been entered to compete with the poultry raisers of the state. Mr. Cox expects to carry off some good premiums at the State Fair. The poultry was judged by Prof. Lamb of the Agricultural College, and the condition of the fowls fully demonstrated that they can be put in excellent show shape even this early in the season. On the average the poultry was up to standard in weight and development.

Taken all in all, as stated at the beginning, the man who said the second annual Morrow County Fair would be "Bigger and Better" was not mistaken. It was a grand success in all departments. To mention one exhibit that we were about to forget, will demonstrate the truth of the statement. This was the department of fancy work. Here alone 1500 entries were made. Some 400 coming from Ironton and about an equal number from Ione, while the ladies of Heppner and vicinity contributed their share in large proportions. It was said by experts in this line that no finer display of this nature has ever been brought together. Had we the space and time we would like to participate on this display, for some of our women folk did themselves proud in the quality and quantity of the work displayed. There was much here to be admired by "mere man" and the ladies were fascinated by the many beautiful and useful articles of woman's handiwork.

Entertainment of Highest Order.

The management are to be congratulated on the successful outcome. They furnished entertainment that was splendid. Nothing on the amusement program but what was of the highest order; in fact in this particular the Fair Board was unusually fortunate. George Parsons, with his band and orchestra were right up and coming all the while with the best of music, and rendered some of the finest concerts ever listened to in Heppner. All Zada was there to amuse the people with his Punch and Judy and works of ledger-drama; Rozalez, the gymnast, who performed in a wonderful way; the Portland Ad Club Quartette, singers of renown, and the little lady, Miss Julia Belmont, who made the double parachute drops from a balloon each day and thrilled the spectators, was the kind of talent that was added to the numerous concessions, such as the merry-go-round, Ferris wheel, glass blowers, etc., and kept something going all the while to amuse and entertain the crowd when they were not busy looking at the exhibits.

Mr. and Mrs. R. Alexander, of Pendleton, were welcome visitors in Heppner on Friday and took in the Fair with the other Round-Up boosters. Mr. Alexander is a pioneer merchant of Pendleton and one of the foremost citizens of that town. He does not come over this way often, and is sorry that he has not been more sociable but he found a welcome here that made him forget past sins and he will surely not put off his coming again so long.

MORROW TEACHERS FAVOR WESTON NORMAL

Pass Resolutions at Institute Held Here Last Week.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the teachers of the Morrow County Institute:

Whereas, the professional training required of those who may teach in the elementary schools of Oregon is rapidly advancing in order to keep abreast of the times, and

Whereas, Oregon is one of the largest Commonwealths of the Union, making it inconvenient and prohibitively expensive for the teachers of Eastern Oregon to attend the Normal School at Monmouth, therefore,

Be It Resolved, by the teachers of Morrow County in annual institute assembled, That they appeal to all friends of the public schools of Oregon to work for the success of the referred Bill No. 316, providing for the re-establishment of an Eastern Oregon Normal School, at the election to be held November 3, 1914, and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be placed in the secretary's book as a part of the permanent records of said institute and copies be forwarded to the county papers, the Oregonian, and the Oregon Teachers Monthly for publication.
